'MOTOR-HIKE' TO BE DROPPED

Fourth Jaunt of Aged Lady Across Continent at End

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 1. (AP)—Mrs. Fannie Streator, of Belknap, Va., aged 81 years, who six weeks ago started to walk to the home of her daughter, Mrs. Wyde Keene of Jacksonville, Ore., reached Chicago a month ago, through the help of automobiles, is still in the mid-west metropolis, according to her daughter, and not apt to proceed farther westward. Mrs. Keene said this morning that she did not expect her mother to visit her as her last letter said she was contented with a light job, in one of the Chicago suburbs. An effort is being made to induce the aged lady to return to her Virginia home. Mrs. Streator has "walked" across the country three times in the last eleven years, twice to this state, and once to Washington state. This spring she started on her fourth trans-continental hike, giving as her reason: "I want to see my grandchildren." She reached Chicago, where she announced her destination with the comment, "I would rather travel than stay home."

The aged lady left Jacksonville last January by train for Virginia and, in June, again started for this valley.

QUIT-RENTS TO KING GEORGE ARE CURIOUS

LONDON, Aug. 1. (AP)—King George would possess a unique collection of "odds and ends" if he enforced all the quit-rents to which he is legally entitled. A "quit-rent" is a contribution in kind made to Britain's reigning sovereign by holders of country estates granted to them by English kings in ancient times. Some, like the miniature Napoleonic standard presented on the anniversary of the battle of Waterloo by the Duke of Wellington, in respect of his estate at Stratfield Saye, are required annually. Others are due on demand.

The Duke of Atholl holds his lands on condition that he present to the king whenever honored with a royal visit in his residence Blair Atholl. The Marquis of Poulis, in similar circumstances, are under the much more difficult obligation to present a snowball.

When His Majesty passes through the town of Creden in Berkshire, the owner of the land on which it is situated has to tender red roses. Should the king visit the village of Amesbury, Wiltshire, the owner of the land on which it is situated is called upon to furnish straw for the royal bed. The holder of the Corber estates in Shropshire is obliged to apply the king's table with bacon when England is at war.

WHY SOLOMON ISLAND DOGS ARE CALLED MAOLA

LONDON, Aug. 1. (AP)—Most of the dogs in the Solomon Islands are called "Maola."

If the visitor calls out "Maola," he may expect to be a second Pied Piper. All the dogs within earshot will follow him. "Why?" one asked of R. F. Thomson, British Acting Deputy Commissioner of the Western Pacific, who is visiting in London. Because Maola means stomach-ache, and the Solomon natives have the curious belief that if they are suffering from an ailment they can get rid of it by calling their dogs the name of the illness. Hence, most of the dogs bear the name Maola. Some few are called Tohi Maola, which means headache, and others Lua Maola, which means pain in the neck.

BRITISH GIRLS MARRY EARLIER, MEN LATER

LONDON, Aug. 1. (AP)—British girls are marrying younger and before the war, but men at a later age, according to statistics by the registrar general. After the war many women married between the ages of 25 and 30. Thousands of marriageable girls lost their sweethearts during the war. Figures show that the majority of brides are now between 20 and 25. They were children during the war. Many of the men now marrying were youths during the war.
