WURTEMBERG AND BADEN IN SUIT OVER WATER

BERLIN (AP)—Wurttemberg and Baden, next to Bavaria the most important southern states in the German Reich, are calling each other thieves in the supreme court at Leipzig. Each maintains that the other is stealing river water.
Wurttemberg claims that the Badense are maliciously and deliberately drawing off waters from the Danube, to the detriment of Swabian industry.
Baden, highly indignant that this is not true. The Badense admit that their River Aach every year gathers up a lot of water from the Danube. But this, they contend, is the work of nature. They say Wurttemberg is stealing.

BOUEN TO RECONSTRUCT SCENE OF JOAN'S DEATH

PARIS (AP)—The city of Bouen plans to reconstruct the market-place where Joan of Arc was burned.
The spot where the firewood was piled by the English and the ground where once stood the tribunal are known and will be marked in a way that will help to visualize the story. Sketches of the proposed restoration show quaint old peak-roofed buildings with overhanging balconies and wide arcades, that open into markets such as the Maid of Orleans must have seen.

MAY DECIDE TO ENTER CONVENT

Queen Marie Considers Idea of Becoming Nun, Says Dispatch

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Aug. 1 (AP)—Grief stricken over the death of her husband, King Ferdinand, Queen Marie may seek peace and consolation within the quiet walls of a convent, it is believed by her close friends. They say she has often been drawn to the picturesque sixteenth century convent, her castle in the Carpathian village of Bran, for prayer, and think it likely that she will join the nuns in this retreat.
From the time Marie came to Rumania 35 years ago she has been deeply interested in the historic Rumanian monasteries and convents, and by study and visits she learned much of their history, architecture and decorations. When the king became seriously ill months ago, she turned more and more to the Bran retreat, and since his death, virtually all of her time has been given over to religion. She has been heard to say repeatedly that relief and consolation from grief and disappointments are to be found only within the cloistered peace of a convent.

Locate Bodies Of Americans In Shell Hole

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1. (AP)—The bodies of seven members of the 7th who were killed in action at the battle of Mont Fouchon have been discovered in an isolated shell hole in France.
A search by the war department has been in progress on French battlefields for nine years in an effort to locate and identify all American dead.
The bodies found included that of Lieutenant William A. Sheehan, Company F, 315th Infantry, whose home was in Washington, D. C. With the officer were the bodies of six enlisted men.
Irving S. Rottis, Brooklyn; August H. Rittmiller, Baltimore; Edward C. Moran, Philadelphia; Jesse E. Schall, Philadelphia; Eli E. Ekwitz, Baltimore; Henry Faller, Pottsville, Pa.
The report received from France by the war department said the bodies were buried and the indications were that burial was by German troops.

DAUGHTER'S CHILDREN TO BEAR FOCH'S NAME

PARIS, Aug. 1. (AP)—Marshall Foch's name is to live on, although there is no male heir. The only son of the commander-in-chief of all the allied armies, a lieutenant, was killed in the war.
Colonel Fournier, husband of one of the marshal's two daughters, has been accorded the right, by presidential decree, to give his children the name Fournier-Foch. This authorization was given by the council of state, at the request of the minister of justice, but had to be made effective by President Doumergue.

SOCIETY ENCOURAGES "VEGETARIAN" MARRIAGES

PARIS, Aug. 1. (AP)—"Vegetarian" weddings are being encouraged by the French Society of Vegetarians. They have organized a series of functions where young lovers of vegetables can start their courtships.
Opposites may be attracted to each other, say some of the leaders of this movement, but the dinner table is likely to become a battleground if there be too great a difference in taste.

CHILDREN'S CLOTHING NOW MATCHES MOTHER'S

LONDON (AP)—Children who accompany their mothers for a stroll in the park must now be miniature editions of their parents, according to a new Mayfair fad. One mother and her three-year-old daughter seen in Hyde Park were dressed in knee-length, sleeveless frocks of the same material and cut, identical loose coats, silk stockings, shoes, gloves and hats.
