

SHIP AGROUND IN HEAVY FOG

Admiral Watson is Reported In Distress In Canadian Waters

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 1. (AP)—Running aground in a dense fog, the Pacific coast steamship company's vessel, Watson, is ashore off Ivory Island, near Prince Rupert, B. C., the Gon-sales wireless station was advised today. A wireless message said the passengers and crew had left the vessel.

The steamship Salvage King was despatched this morning to the scene of the accident and the steamer Admiral Rodgers of the Pacific Steamship company and the tug Lorne were also proceeding to the aid of the Watson through the fog.

The Admiral Watson which plies between Seattle and southern Alaska, reported to the Bull Harbor radio station at midnight last night that she was aground.

The following report was received by the local wireless station from Bull Harbor this morning.

"Admiral Watson reported aground off Ivory Island. Unable to get off without assistance. Struck in dense fog. Leaking in No. 1 hold. Passengers and

crew left ship in boats. Admiral Rogers and tug Lorne proceeding to her assistance as fast as fog permits."

Squatters Ignore Warning; Arrested

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1. (A. P.)—Warning that if they ever returned to the Umpqua national forest as squatters they would be held for contempt of court failed to daunt E. H. Best and Emory Davis, government officers reported today. After being advised on Jan. 20 that they were forever barred from squatters rights, they returned to the reserve, officers said.

Yesterday they were served with subpoenas by Deputy United States Marshal Loren Cochran, citing them to appear in federal court September 5 to show cause why they should not be found guilty of contempt of court.

Both men live below Crescent Lake. No settling is permitted by the government on the reserve.

C. CHAMBERLIN POPULAR PROF HOPS OFF SHIP MARRIED TODAY

New Chapter in Aviation Inaugurated by Daring Flyer Today

U. S. S. DESTROYER LAWRENCE, Aug. 1. (AP)—A new chapter in the history of aviation was begun today when Clarence D. Chamberlin hopped off from the Leviathan in his Fokker bi-plane and headed for Teterboro Heights, N. J.

The hopoff, a beautiful one, was made at 8:14. The little Fokker sped down the improvised runway on the boat deck of the flagship of the United States line, gripped the air at once, and within a second or so was doing a circle over the big liner.

Ascension was made by use of blocks which held the plane in position as the motor attained a speed that would ensure a take-off. Chamberlin manipulated his

plane so that it leaped the blocks and the flight was on. The purpose of the flight was to test the feasibility of having planes take off from liners at sea, thus cutting off many hours from the ship's voyage time. Passengers and mail could thus be taken ashore much in advance of the arrival of the ship. Chamberlin's hopoff was the first ever made from a liner at sea and marks a new era in aviation.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 1. (AP)—The marriage of Professor George S. Turnbull of the University of Oregon, school of Journalism faculty, and Miss Mary Lou Burton took place at 2:15 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the residence of Dean and Mrs. Eric W. Allen, 2239 Birch Lane.

Rev. Charles F. Elliott, father of Mrs. Allen, performed the ceremony in the presence of seventeen friends and relatives.

A luncheon followed the service after which Mr. and Mrs. Turnbull left for cities in Washington and on to Victoria, B. C., for a few weeks' trip. They will return to reside at 1410 Twentieth Ave., east Eugene.

Professor Turnbull is a graduate of the University of Washington with the class of 1915, finishing with high honors. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, scholastic society, Sigma Delta Chi, men's honorary journalism society, and Theta Chi fraternity. He is secretary of the Oregon state newspaper conference.

Mrs. Turnbull graduated from the University of Oregon in 1923 and has since worked on news-

papers at Bend, Oregon, Kureka, Calif., and Portland. She is a member of Theta Sigma Phi, women's national journalism society and of Psi Chi, women's writing society.
