



## YANKEES DROP ANOTHER GAME

Slight Indication of Slump Seen in Defeat at Hands of Detroit

(By the Associated Press.) The possibility of the Boston Red Sox getting out of the American league cellar was considerably brightened today. Bill Carrigan's tallenders beat the Chicago White Sox 5-1, while the Washington Senators were taking both ends of a double header from the St. Louis Browns, who occupy second place in the standing. The Red Sox still are 8 and one half game behind St. Louis, but the Browns are playing poor baseball.

Miller Huggins' Yankees gave just the faintest indication they are in a slump by dropping another game to Detroit, 6-2. The Yankees today face the task of winning the final game of the series or losing their first series at home.

Garland Buckeye, the mountain man of the Cleveland pitching corps, whitewashed the Mackmen at Philadelphia 5-0.

The National league situation was altered slightly, although the leaders won their games. The Chicago Cubs beat out the Boston Braves 5-4, but Pittsburgh took a double header from the lowly Phillies, and moved within one game of the leadership. Milwaukee got credit for the first victory 8-5, while Ray Kremer had little trouble winning the second, 7-2.

The Giants trotted over Cincinnati, 4-1, Benton being stingy with his arm.

Brooklyn drabbed the world's champion Cardinals at St. Louis 4-2.

## CHICAGO SCHOOLS ADD COURSE IN AVIATION

CHICAGO, Aug. 5. (AP)—High school students of Chicago are to learn in the classroom the principles of flying.

The subject will be incorporated in a general mathematics course, and J. Lewis Coath, president of the board of education, has invited aviation and radio experts to assist in a preliminary study which will enable adaptation of such training to public school use.

The study will be the first of its sort in the United States, Coath believes, and will be eagerly sought because of the renewed interest in aviation.

## BILLY EVANS Says

Sisler Rivals Cobb. George Sisler has a penchant for breaking records held by Ty Cobb.

Back in 1911, the Georgia peach socked the ball to the extent of 120, to lead the American League in batting. Eleven years later Sisler equaled the performance.

Another record of which Cobb was very proud, was that of having batted safely one or more times in 40 consecutive games. The same year, 1922, that Sisler tied Cobb's mark of 120, the best batting average ever made in the American League, he also surpassed Ty's consecutive hitting feat.

## MAKES TINY MOTOR.

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 5.—The smallest electric motor ever made, only half as high as a ten-cent piece and weighing 100 grains, is being shown by E. Kahm, local garage man who has worked on the tiny mechanism for three years in his spare time. It runs at 400 revolutions a minute and contains 53 parts of gold, silver, copper, brass and iron.

## Failed at This One.

Only recently Sisler threatened a batting feat of which Ty Cobb is justly proud, the making of 11 consecutive base hits.

Speaker made his record during the season of 1920, noted for unusual batting feats. It included 10 singles, two of them bunts, and one double.

Sisler's attack on Speaker's consecutive hitting record was broken after he had made eight in a row. Unlike Speaker, Sisler scattered a number of extra base hits into the effort, making a home run, a triple, three doubles and the same number of singles before he was stopped.

Charley Ruffing of the Boston Red Sox was the pitcher to end Sisler's base hit rampage. He made him ground out to First Baseman Todd in his ninth attempt.

Several years ago, as I recall it, Sisler made 10 hits in a row, only to be stopped in the same manner, a ground ball to the first baseman on which he was retired.

His Greatest Feat. While Sisler is proud of the

records I have discussed, he tells me that his greatest thrill as far as batting is concerned was limited to a one-day performance.

In a game with Washington, he first came to the bat with the bases filled, and proceeded to clear them with a triple. The next inning he was up again with the sacks loaded. This time he made a home run.

N Thus, in two consecutive innings, through the medium of a triple and a home run, Sisler had the unique distinction of driving seven runs over the plate. It's a record as far I know.

"That was real action out of a clear sky," says Sisler. "While I have a feeling of pride in my other efforts, still I cannot say that I greatly enjoyed the various experiences."

One is too tense and the strain at times is terrific in registering a record like hitting safely in 41 consecutive games.

## DOG SAVES HIM.

ROCKFORD, Ill., Aug. 5.—Discovering that one of his dogs was an egg-stealer, W. P. Pierce, farmer, decided to kill the animal. ## GERMANS PREPARING WAGNER FILM

BERLIN, Aug. 5. (AP)—A film entitled "Richard Wagner and 50 Years of Bayreuth" is being prepared simultaneously at Leipzig, Bayreuth and Munich under the management of Film Director Firmann. It will be brought out this year. The foremost Wagner historians have collaborated in the writing of the scenario, which also calls for the inclusion of the opera performances at the coming Bayreuth festival.

For the production and promulgation of the film a special syndicate has been formed comprising Siegfried Wagner, prominent musical professors and Wagner biographers from all parts of Germany, the director of the

Leipzig conservatory, Professor Max Paer, and many notables of Leipzig, Bayreuth and Munich.

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
