SLOW MOVIES FALLIBLE IN SETTLING DECISIONS

NEW YORK, Aug. 5. (AP)—Two recent incidents in sport have proved that even the motion picture camera is fallible as a court of appeal from most decisions. When "slow movies" were devised the sport world anticipated a visual record of close race finishes and questioned fight blows which would establish decisions beyond doubt.

Prevent Waste In Shark's Carcass

SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 5. (UP)—Like the Chicago meat-packing factories which use every part of the pig but the squeal, a shark factory operating at Carnarvon (Western Australia) utilizes all portions of sharks except their ability to bite.

From the liver is extracted an oil, claimed to be more efficacious than cod-liver oil. The skins are stripped and used for leather, later to adorn military's silken-hosed feet or to provide her with handbags. The flesh is filleted, salted and sun-dried for export to China, to be the favored delicacy of a war-lord's dinner table. And to provide the said war-lord with an appetizer, the fins of the sea monster are preserved and canned, to be converted into soup.

Sharks abound off most of the Australian coast at different times of the year, and promoters of the industry, which has only recently started, claim that they will make surf-bathing safer and their own fortunes.

They put their theories into actual practice in 81 model cottages, which are part of the state high school system. The girls work out all the problems of home economics, ranging from cooking and sewing to house beautification and landscape gardening.
