

JACK DEMPSEY IN HOT WATER

Court Action to Be Started Against Championship Battle

CHICAGO, Aug. 5. (AP)—The Chicago Coliseum club, headed by B. E. Clements, announced through Ralph Rosen, its chief counsel, today, that it intended to start court action to prevent Jack Dempsey boxing Gene Tunney here next month for the heavyweight championship.

Rosen's statement pointed out that Dempsey in March, 1926, had contracted to box Harry Willis under Clements' promotion and agreed to fight no one else in the interim. Rosen obtained an injunction in an Indiana court prohibiting Dempsey from fighting Tunney at Philadelphia, but the decree was not recognized in Pennsylvania.

Advance notice of the intention of the Coliseum club was given, Rosen said, because "we don't wish to be placed in the position in the court actions which are to be brought, of opening the way for a defense upon the theory that the public, whose interests and reports are always to be given first consideration, was not advised of the true state of facts in time to prevent financial loss."

It is a vast storehouse of undeveloped mineral resources, which when even partially developed will produce wealth far beyond the dreams of its most enthusiastic propagandists. I believe the time is not far distant when the pioneer spirit that has made the west will again manifest itself towards Alaska, and then that great territory will come into its own."
