



CUBS MOVE UP BY WINNING

National League Leaders Tighten Hold; Yanks Whip Bengals

(By the Associated Press) Chicago could regard her Cubs jubilantly today, as they apparently had picked up the right trail to treating the national league pennant.

Six consecutive victories, 3 in a sweep over the flashy Braves, pushed the Cubs in front by two full games.

Percy Jones polished off the Boston warriors by a five to two verdict before a ladies' day crowd totalling some 32,000.

Cy Williams went a long way in wrecking the Pirates by lashing out a homer, a triple and double and a single in four official times at bat, as the Phillies hung up a 9 to 7 victory.

Adolfo Luque, Cincinnati's Cuban hurler, had the Giants helpless while the Reds finished in front, 3 to 0.

Brooklyn trounced the Cardinals 5 to 2, giving the Robins the series by 2 to 1.

Babe Ruth showed the stadium fans he still was in the home run sprint by socking the ball into right field bleachers for his 35th of the year, as the Yanks whipped the Bengals into submission 5 to 2.

The Senators waded through 17 hits donated by St. Louis hurlers for a 17 to 3 triumph.

Carrigan's Red Sox stopped the pale hose 4 to 1 for their fourth straight verdict.

The Indians' fray at Philadelphia was washed out by rain.

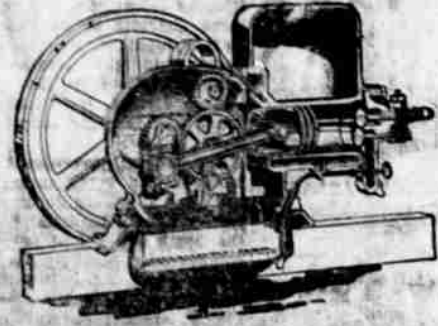

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CHANNEL SWIM IS SUCCESSFUL

English Aquatic Star Beats Gertrude's Time

DOVER, Eng., Aug. 5. (AP)—E. H. Temme, aged 22, English swimmer, succeeded today in the first attempt of the season to swim the English channel. Taking off from Cape Gris Nez at 12:42 o'clock this morning, Temme landed two miles west of Dover.

Mrs. Clemington (Mille Gade) Corson of New York, who last year became the second woman to swim the channel, and who now is training for another crossing, witnessed the last stage of Temme's swim.

Mrs. Corson is preparing to attempt to swim from England to France, the reverse direction of her first swim.

Temme's time, as computed by representatives of Lloyd's, was 14 hours, 27 minutes. This is four minutes faster than Gertrude Ederle's time last year, but has been beaten by three men, Ernst Vierkotter, Georges Michel and Norman Leslie Durham in earlier channel swims.
