Kicks at the subway entrances were practically demolished and windows of surrounding buildings were shattered four stories up from the street. By fortunate coincidence a train was in neither station when the explosion occurred, although in one instance a train was approaching at the time and the brakes were applied so suddenly that dozens of passengers were thrown from their seats.

Police commissioner Warren this morning cancelled all vacations of policemen and recalled to duty all on vacation who were within reach. Uniformed men were placed on every station platform and plain-clothes investigators were assigned to travel on the trains and circulate among the crowds on the platforms.

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Ryan, in charge of the investigation of the bombing of two subway stations last night said he had requested that Seigel be held without bail because of his "unusual and suspicious manner" during questioning after a detective had stopped him as he was attempting to enter Sain Patrick's cathedral a few hours after the bombings.

Anarchists

Ryan said Seigel acknowledged he was an anarchist, saying he had come from Russia 14 years ago.

Ryan declined to say just what part Seigel was suspected of having taken in the bombing, confining himself to general statements. "I ascertained from Seigel," he said, "that he was arrested in Spokane, Wash. 3
