ROMANCES OF CIRCUS FREAKS.

New York Times: Bearded women, blue men, sword swallowers, tattooed wonders, strong men, midgets and living skeletons conceal beneath their odd exteriors the same feelings that animate more ordinary looking individuals. Joe, "the boy with the elastic skin," had but the one extraordinary faculty. Otherwise he was very much like the rest of us—bled when he was pricked and all that.

His disappointments seem to have meant more to him than to the average person, for he died for love. Most boys equipped with a fair grade of inelastic skin find it less than his. They survive when the object of their affections jilts them. Still, it may be more despairful to be thrown over by a tattooed woman.

It is natural that people who work at less thrilling jobs than exhibiting themselves in a circus sideshow should be more impressed by the differences from themselves of such freaks than by the similarities. It seems to them remarkable that a boy with an elastic skin should share the common emotions of the rest of mankind.

Perhaps one reason why circus freaks, interesting as they are, do not figure much in fiction is because neither the author nor the reader can identify himself with the strange hero. O. Henry wrote a story about the romance of a professional thin man and a waitress who hit it off beautifully because he couldn't eat and she couldn't bear to watch anybody eat after her duty in that line was done for the day.

BE CHARITABLE TO THE COP.

Anniston Star: Consider the cop.

If ever there was a public servant so subject to criticism his position was abolished the day before it was created. If the cop does nothing he is attacked for inactivity and if he does anything at all he is vilified as a petty tyrant. In either case he is reviled for a mammoth stupidity.

And he would be just as stupid as his most noisy enemy if he did not spot, after being on duty for two minutes, that he is "it" in one of America's great games. Everyone considers "fooling the cop" as a legitimate amusement and the people who play it are the loudest in yelling "no fair" when the policeman, goaded by the plainly evident attempt to make a fool of him, occasionally makes a pinch.

When the officer stops to caution an offender he receives an excuse so childish that the cop should run the suspect in for a mental examination. If for no other reason. Offenders will try to justify themselves in such a manner that the excuse becomes

a far greater crime than the charges.

Next time a cop runs you in for passing a red light or some other assault upon the foundations of civilization, be charitable. Perhaps it is not the gravity of a traffic law violation that actuates the cop. It is far more likely that it is the cumulative effect of so many tubercle excuses.

It is a good idea to devote a little plain and fancy thinking to intelligent answers for the next policeman who stops you. Such procedure will prove immensely profitable. It will make the cop your friend for he will respect your mentality. And also, don't forget, if more time were devoted to thinking plausible answers much less time will be given to creating occasions to use them. It will be a great crime deterrent.

INSTRUCTING THE MOTHERS.

Emporia Gazette: Kansas is one of the states that stood for the Shephard-Towner maternity bill. While the bill was going through congress, Senator Jim Reed and other reactionaries attacked it because it was supposed to tell mothers how to have babies. The other day Sir George Newman of England in the course of a lecture at Yale university, declared that in proportion to population, more mothers die in the United States during the period of maternity than in any other civilized country in the world.

During 1925, 18,400 mothers succumbed to the pangs of childbirth in this country, compared with only 2,700 in England and Wales. Florida had the worst record—10.2 per 1,000 births for white women and 16.3 for colored women. Maryland appeared to have the best record.

The total maternity mortality in the United States was 7.5, as compared with 3.3 per 1,000 births in England.

"After examining the official returns of the last five years," said Sir George, "I cannot escape the conclusion that the maternity mortality rate in America is a grave problem, calling for the most serious attention of the American people."

The Shephard-Towner law is intended to reduce the death rate, and where it has been tried the death rate has been cut down. Smarties like Jim-Reed and other reactionaries can make all the wise-cracks they please, but the government is going into the business of instructing women in motherhood. Motherhood is the chief end of women, and as long as we are instructing farmers how to grow pigs and calves and sheep and horses and chickens, why shouldn't we improve the grade of human beings? Kansas did well to get the appropriation from the Shephard-Towner maternity bill.
