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Metropolises of World Guard
Against More Bomb Outrages

(By Associated Press)

Throughout the world extraordinary precautions are being taken wherever police think it necessary to avoid repetition of such incidents as the bombing of two New York subway stations, supposedly by Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers.

New York—14,000 police have been put on 14-hour shifts; all vacations revoked and days off cancelled, and heavy guards put on duty at subway, railroad, elevated stations, prominent buildings and strategic points.

Close scrutiny of storage places of explosives ordered, with daily check of all withdrawn under permit. Prompt report ordered of any suspicious circumstances in connection with fires, especially if there is any suggestion of explosive origin.

BOSTON—National guardmen

patrol federal building, public is limited to use of one door only of postoffice, police vacations revoked and policemen ordered to sleep on cots at stations instead of going home when off duty.

Rapid City, S. D.—President's civilian guard increased vigilance, but is not reinforced; military guard increased from one to three men.

Washington—Guards at public buildings ordered to look out for suspicious characters; justice and state departments given extra protection. Watchmen assigned to homes of officials.

Baltimore—Guards ordered to surround public buildings; additional police order to attend two meetings of Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers.

Buffalo—Orders issued for inspection of all pedestrians on international bridge after 1 p. m. Sunday, and heavy guard arranged to protect Prince of Wales, Premier Baldwin, Vice President Dawes and Secretary Kellogg during dedication ceremonies.

Chicago—Twenty-three federal agents begin night and day watch of federal buildings and are ordered to shoot first and ask questions afterward in emergency. Cleveland—Marines and detectives ordered to guard federal building.

San Francisco—Roman Catholic church of Saint Peter and Paul, previously bombed, placed under guard.

Paris—Parade of Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers banned. U. S. embassy and consulate under guard.

London—Special Scotland Yard

force responsible for safety of embassies and legations is reinforced.

Berlin—Deputations of communists and socialists refused admittance to the U. S. embassy; American buildings guarded.

Stockholm—Government forbids demonstration in front of U. S. embassy.

Buenos Aires—Business houses close to avoid damage by Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers.

Lowell, Mass.—Special police details put on full time duty around court building and personal guards assigned to judges.

Albany, N. Y.—Littering forbidden near state and city buildings.

Annapolis, Md.—Police detail assigned to watch executive mansion.

(Continued From Page One) return to Klamath Falls and at that time will issue a formal statement making public our plans in as much detail as we can afford. But this trip, beyond saying that the plant will be constructed in the near future, I would rather not make any further statement to the newspapers.

"Our plans have not changed," he commented at one point in the interview.

By that statement, it is taken that the Weyerhaeuser Timber company will stand behind the statement of its manager, Mr. Long—on the witness stand at the interstate commerce commission hearing of the Klamath railroad case.

Mr. Long's statement, an epochal one for the Klamath Basin, was approximately as follows:

That the Weyerhaeuser Timber company would not manufacture its lumber in Klamath unless competitive railroad service was offered. And that the Weyerhaeuser Timber company would construct a large plant concurrently with the building of the Oregon Trunk railroad extension from Bend south to connect with the Southern Pacific main line at Chemult.

As usual, Mr. Long was affable and easily approached—but for the first time during the past few years, he obviously did not want to be interviewed.

"As a matter of fact," Mr. Long commented, "my itinerary did not include Klamath Falls when I started out. I was called to San Francisco to attend a lumber convention, and from there journeyed to Susanville, Calif. Being more or less in this part of the country, I came north through Klamath Falls."

Included in Mr. Long's party were F. R. Titcomb, assistant general manager, and A. Onstead, mill designer employed by the company.

migration act could not have been admitted.

"I know Governor Fuller of Massachusetts and know several of the board of citizens who assisted him in final examination of murder charges and evidence. They are convinced that Sacco and Vanzetti are guilty and these men in my opinion are as guilty as were the McNamara brothers, who blew up the Los Angeles Times building, killing twenty or more, and who confessed their crime after a great defense fund had been raised by sympathetic working men.

Guilt.

"They are as guilty as those who conspired to and did murder Governor Stuenkel of Idaho. They are as guilty as those who assassinated the world war veterans at Centralia, Wash., on the first Armistice day. They are as guilty as Berkman who tried to kill Rick in Pittsburgh and dodged deportation for a dozen years after serving his prison term. Sacco and Vanzetti are aliens. That makes no difference. Had they been foully murdered by Americans, this government would have had to apologize to Italy and pay great sums in damages.

"Demonstrations may go on in other lands. That is the affair of other governments. Foreign demonstrations can neither affect nor frighten the United States government nor any sovereign state thereof. These demonstrations began originally in order to create a 'situation' for the benefit of the communists of the world without any real knowledge as to the guilt or innocence of the murderers. Don't be fooled in that kind of propaganda. Union labor men and women should read the recent statement of Mathew Wold, vice president of the American Federation of Labor, that there is real danger from violent soviet communistic activities which rage everywhere without check or restraint."

Would Check Radicalism.

Johnson added: "We hope soon to put through congress a law by which naturalized citizens, who, after swearing allegiance to the United States wear black shirts and swear undying allegiance to Mussolini or any other dictator, or who support any other government, shall be deprived of their naturalization. Citizenship is the greatest gift the United States has to bestow. It has been gladly received by millions.

"The time has come when such acquired citizenship shall not be used by radicals to the danger of this great government."

FRENCH RIVIERA TO
HAVE AIR SERVICE

PARIS, Aug. 8. (AP)—A daily air service from Marseilles to Nice will shortly connect the French riviera with the capitals of Europe.

Because of the lack of a suitable landing field the flight from Marseilles will be made with hydroplanes which will use Villefranche bay, two miles from Nice, as a base.

The contour of the riviera is such that it will be necessary for engineers practically to build the mile-square landing field necessary for large passenger planes. It is expected that the work of leveling such a field will be started next year. The hydroplane service will start in the near future.

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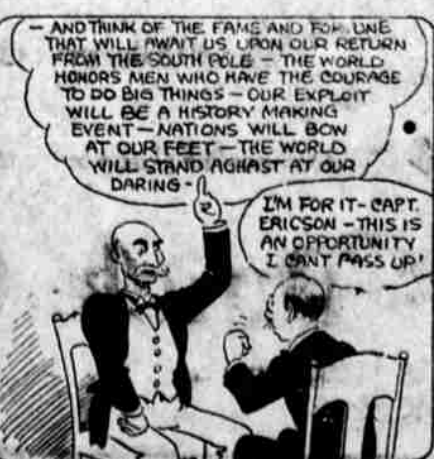
