AMERICA CITED AS "HORRIBLE EXAMPLE"

LONDON, Aug. 10. (AP)—Lord Dawson of Penn., personal physician to King George and the Prince of Wales, sees in the United States a "horrible example" of what prohibition can do.

"I have never seen in recent years drunkenness of such a terrible character as in America," he told the House of Lords in the course of a speech in which he opposed a bill proposed by the prohibition party which would put local option laws into effect.

"You will see, as I have seen, far less drunkenness in this country than in America," he said. "British people are becoming more sober."
