ing crashed near San Diego as they were heading for San Francisco Bay. With this spectre of death facing them the pilots and navigators on the ground here showed no inclination to quit the race.

Severity of Tests.
Instead they complained about the severity of tests imposed by department of commerce inspectors, who were insistent that pilots display more than ordinary skill before being certified. The San Francisco Chronicle says protests were lodged over this attitude with Secretary of Commerce Hoover, but that official refused to interfere. Individual pilots and navigators denied they had complained. The tests continued today.

The Chronicle also said Clarence M. Young, director of aeronautics of the department of commerce, who has been inspecting the Dale flight entrants, left Oakland last night for Washington after the complaint had been lodged.

Actual Demonstration.
Lieutenant Ben Wyatt, naval aviator, who is an authority on navigation and in charge of navigation tests for the entrants here, has insisted on an actual demonstration of ability to fly over a prescribed course without being more than ten percent inaccurate. Only four have passed this test. They are:

1—The Travelair monoplane "Oklahoma," Bennett P. Griffin, pilot, and Al Heney navigator.

2—Monoplane "El Camo" of San Diego, Norman A. Goddard pilot and Lieutenant R. C. Hawkins navigator.

3—The Brees monoplane "Pacific Flyer" in which Livingston G. Irving of Berkeley, will hop off without a navigator.

4—The monoplane "Golden Eagle," entry of the San Francisco Examiner, piloted by Jack Groat with Gordon, Scott, navigator.

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off in the order named and those who qualify today will obtain places in the starting line in the order of qualification.

Girl May Qualify.
The monoplane in which Miss Mildred Doran, 22-year-old Michigan school teacher, will ride to Hawaii, stood a fair chance of gaining approval as the fifth entrant today. J. A. Pedlar, the pilot, watched navigators and it was expected that Lieutenant Miles Knapp, engaged yesterday, would pass the navigation test easily.

Captain Wm. P. Erwin, flying the "Dallas Spirit," was ready for his half load test today. He abandoned his original plan to fly alone and has engaged A. H. Eichwald, 27-year-old navigator.

The "City of Peoria," a tiny biplane, was flown by Chas. W. Parkhurst, was on the compass testing table and plans were made for the half load tests. Ralph Lowes, navigator, has the tests of Lieutenant Wyatt before him also.
