TRAP SHOOTING CONTEST WILL BE HELD HERE

Crack Shots of Southern
and Central Oregon
Invited to Klamath

Crack shots in the scatter gun sport of southern and central Oregon, are invited by the Klamath Gun club to participate in the Southern Oregon trapshooting tournament which will be staged on the club grounds several miles north of Pelican City, September 4th and 5th.

The tournament has been registered by the American Trap Shooting association and the scores chalked up by participants will therefore be official.

No contestant who lives outside of Oregon or who resides north of Bend or Eugene, is eligible for trophies. However, a cordial invitation has been extended to Portland trapshooters to take part.

"Championship of southern Oregon will probably be determined at this shoot," Dr. W. R. Boyd, member of the club, said yesterday. "We are expecting to have a big turn out from all cities of southern Oregon and as far north as Bend and Eugene."

"Klamath, by virtue of its good showing in state shoots has quickly taken a prominent position in trap shooting circles. We will have the Oregon state shoot in Klamath, June 8, 9, and 10, 1928."

Following are salient features of program of the southern Oregon shoot:

* Shooting will start at 9:30 a. m. Please be prompt. A. T. A. Rules will govern all points.

Shooters will be classified according to their known ability.

Several standard makes of shells will be sold at the grounds at \$1.00 and \$1.15 per box. Birds will be 3 cents each.

Contestants may shoot for money or for birds only.

Those shooting for birds only, will be eligible for all trophies and prizes.

Members of all gun clubs in Oregon south of Eugene and Bend (including both cities) are eligible to win trophies.

Merchandise prizes are available to all shooters and will be awarded to high guns in each class in each 15 Yard Hundred, and high guns in each Handicap Hundred, and in Doubles.

August 16th, 1901
Corbett vs. Dixon

Twenty-six years ago today, Earl Rothwell of Denver better known to the fight fraternity as "Young Corbett," advanced a round on the pugilistic ladder by meeting and defeating Geo. Dixon, former featherweight champion of the world, in ten fast rounds at Denver, Col.
Corbett had been coming along at a rapid pace and by virtue of this victory gained recognition as the most logical contender for the title. Three months later he was pitted against the famous Terry McGovern who then reigned over the featherweights. In this memorable ring battle, the Denverite emerged victorious and was crowned champion of the world.

But Fernandez never makes a move without consulting his friend and advisor, Senor Tomas Cortez, graduate of an American university in Manila. Cortez supplies the business sense for the combination.

Fernandez, in his American debut, knocked out Abe Attell Goldstein, winning a mile-wide decision by whipping over a finishing blow in the seventh round.

'13' Unlucky For B. Jones In Golf Play

There may be nothing in the thirteen superstition, but you would have a difficult time convincing Bobby Jones of its iniquity. If there happens to be such a word, or me, after the thirteenth hole in the third round at the 1927 United States open golf championship at Oakland.

The short thirteenth hole at Oakland basied the world's champion—he was champion at the moment—as conclusively as the long twelfth, or Ghost Hole, broke him eight years before in the match with Davy Herron on the same course. Well, maybe not quite so definitely, the Herron affair being match play, and the recent business being medal play, in which Bobby stood up to the thirteenth hole with two-thirds of the tournament back of him and one-third left to play.

Here was the situation. Bobby had never been right from the start on the great Oakland course. His first round had been saved from blue ruin by wonderful putting, long putts holed in crisis after crisis. It might as well have been an 80 as the 78 he turned in. His second round was better played, but it had more putts in it—four more, as I recall it—and the

card was 72. He was six strokes back of the lead, just as he was at Peloto last year, with 38 holes to play. He was furious with his bad play, but not disheartened. He was determined and cool and in a fighting mood as he went to the first tee of the third round. His idea was that a couple of rounds of 72 would be good enough. His score would be 291. He felt that would win.

The idea was O. K. A score of 291 would have won with three strokes to spare. The excruciatingly better third round, 73, was not so good, however. But Bobby started hitting his

He lost one stroke to par on the thirteenth tee, level with par, and hitting his shot at last, he felt that he would not trade positions with any other man in the field. He told me so later. He was only a couple of strokes with 21 holes to play—and he behind now—a grand position. He was hitting his shots at last.

Personally I admit I felt he had another championship in the bag. He was sitting pretty.

Then he missed the long, narrow, prov-shaped thirteenth green with a mashie tee-shot, and the ball was so wide on the left that it also missed the big bunker and stopped in a narrow ditch. This, as it turned out, stopped the champion. He had to back the ball out of the ditch and it stopped in the lee side of the big bunker. His curtailed

swing could not get it out, now that it was under the bank on the side of the green. One more blast—the ball was on, in 4.

"Then," said Bobby afterward, "I carefully missed the putt."

It was about seven feet. He had a ghastly 6. He was three strokes down to Old Man Par. He narrowly missed a birdie 3 at the next, and fell away to another 6 by trying too hard to place his tee-shot at the long and difficult fifteenth. A 5 at the par-3 sixteenth merely added insult to injury. Bobby was through. The four par-3 holes at Oakland in that terrible round of 79 cost him 19 strokes—seven over par. He was eight strokes back of the lead as round 1 began.

Nobody fancied Bobby Jones could shoot four rounds on any course and not break 78. But he did. Remember, I told you Oakland was quite a golf course.
