For the purpose of investigating unproductive lands of the reclamation project together with the economic side of the drainage system, George Kreutzer, director of the division of reclamation and economics of the United States Reclamation Bureau of Washington, D. C., will meet with the Klamath Land Settlement board at the chamber of commerce Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

Mr. Kreutzer with a party from San Francisco will arrive in the city tomorrow morning and remain here over Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. H. E. Kelley, representative of the executive department of the Southern Pacific will accompany Mr. Kreutzer's party, according to wires received here today.

Along with unproductive lands and the drainage system, Mr. Kreutzer will look into the lower lands of Klamath lake from a pasture stand while here.

hatched to the homes of three other jurors who live in the vicinity.

The blast occurred at 3:30. At three o'clock the policeman whose beat passed the McHardy house, seeing his box about 200 yards away. The policeman said he saw nothing suspicious in the neighborhood, but a report reached the police that a small sedan had been seen leaving the vicinity shortly before the explosion.

The family went to bed about 11 o'clock and had seen no one

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in the immediate neighborhood during the evening who aroused any suspicion. The McHardy home is in a sparsely settled section of the town with woods bordering two sides of it.

McHardy said that a long time ago he had received a threatening letter as had others of the jurors in the famous trial. He said that he had not feared an attack on his life as to his safety. He is employed in a chocolate factory in Milton.

During the investigation by Alvin T. Fuller, into the case, McHardy had been called for full questioning. He was in the chambers about two hours, since then he said he had received no threats of any kind.

"The first I knew," said Theodore McHardy, "I found myself on the floor of the attic, where

Jack and I had our rooms. I thought at first I had simply fallen out of bed in a nightmare or something of the kind, and then suddenly the floor began to shake under me and I heard a dull roar, followed by a strange humming sound like an airplane in the distance.

"The door fell in upon me, the glass in the window fell smashing in the floor and before I was really awake the roof opened up and I could see the sky."

He said he groped his way to the room in which his brother Jack had been sleeping and the two then searched for their sister and let her out through a hole in the side of the house. They went back after their parents and found their mother lying on the floor, cut and bruised, and their father groping about in the debris.
