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MARKET AGENT TO STRIVE FOR BETTER RATES

Reduction Sought by Seymour Jones; Would Be Big Saving

RALEIGH, Ore., Aug. 17. (AP)—Seymour Jones, state market agent, announced today that he will begin a fight for a freight

rate reduction on deciduous fruits shipped east from the Pacific northwest, similar to the reduction recently granted California shippers by the Interstate Commerce Commission. The reduction, if obtained, Jones said, will be from 10 to 25c a bushel on much fruit shipped.

"I notice in dispatches from Washington," said Jones, "that the I. C. C. has granted substantial reductions in rates on deciduous fruits from California to all eastern consuming points east of Denver and the rocky mountain territory. This reduction from California points east now gives that territory in fresh fruit shipments, other than apples, a much cheaper freight rate than now applies to North Pacific points, but the same principle which warranted reduction from California points would also apply to North Pacific points. Fresh fruit shipments from the north Pacific points are subject to a very burdensome freight rate to eastern points and a united effort should now be made by the fruit growers of Oregon and Washington, aided by the public service commission, to secure a reduction on a parity with California."

"One of the members of the I. C. C. intimated very strongly that the north Pacific states would now be entitled to a reduction if an effort was made to secure them. If we can secure a reduction in this territory it

Mayor of Rainier To Fight Recall

RAINIER, Ore., Aug. 17. (AP)—Mayor A. Veatch, recalled by a vote of 263 to 179 in a special election yesterday, declared that he would contest the election.

Councilmen Van Knaut and E. P. Haugeberg also were recalled. The vote on Knaut was yes 260, no 182; on Haugeberg yes 267, no 176.

Mayor Veatch declared he would attack legality of the election on three grounds: change of election date; failure to publish election notice in the Rainier newspaper; and alleged illegal functioning of the election board.

The recall election, which split this town in a very heated campaign, resulted from charges by a recall committee that Mayor and two councilmen had been neglectful of duties.

\$16,000 Warehouse On Spring Finished

Completion of another commercial building, the Balsiger Motor Storage and Warehouse located on Spring street, was announced today by the W. D. Miller Construction company.

Built of concrete and tile the two-story building will store on the average of 125 cars for the local concern. It was erected at a cost of \$16,000 and covers a space of 59x140 feet.

It is the intention of Mr. Balsiger to move into the building around the last of this week.

JAMES HILL'S GIRL OPPOSES MERGER PLAN

Prominent Stockholders in Two Roads Suggest Different Method

NEW YORK, Aug. 17. (AP)—Clara Hill Lindley, daughter of Jas. J. Hill, "the empire builder," and her husband, Erasmus R. Lindley, today made public a petition to the Interstate Commerce commission to intervene in the Great Northern-Northern Pacific unification hearings. The petitioners, who are substantial holders of the securities of both roads, favor unification of the ownership, control and operation of the northern lines and the Burlington, but state that such unification should be effected through the utilization of one of the three roads as a base, rather than through the instrumentality of a new Delaware company as proposed in the original plan. Mr. and Mrs. Lindley suggest that leasing the properties of the Northern Pacific to the Great Northern would be more in the public interest and more consistent with the letter and spirit of the transportation act, because the Great Northern is a Minnesota corporation with broad charter powers.

It is also contended that Minnesota is the actual and legal status of a larger portion of the approximately 26,000 miles of railway line involved than any other state. They added it would be more compatible with the public interest for the Great Northern to issue \$250,000,000 additional capital stock in exchange for a like amount of Northern Pacific stock than for the proposed Delaware company to issue about \$500,000,000 capital stock in exchange for stock of the two northern lines. They describe the proposed holding company as a "paper corporation of Delaware, without substantial property or credit."

Mrs. Elizabeth Spaulding McElwee, the widow, was named chief heir and residuary legatee. One thousand shares of stock of the Continental and Commercial National Bank of Chicago, all real estate, furniture and household good were left to her.

Trigg Waller, Highland Park, a nephew, now deceased a niece, Nannie Waller Patterson of Medford, Ore., and a sister, Virginia McElwee Bartolomeo, were each left three hundred shares of bank stock.

Three hundred shares of bank stock were left to Flora McElwee Miller of Lexington, Va. In the event of her death the stock is to be divided equally between her sons, William and Francis.
