Trip to K. F. Made in Fast Time by Auto

What is thought to be a record run between Boise, Idaho, and Klamath Falls, a distance of more than 500 miles, was made yesterday by Mrs. J. T. Toy and son who arrived here at the Hotel Hall twenty minutes before midnight last evening, making the trip in little less than 17 hours.

Running a close second, and unaware that they had traveled over the same road from Payette, Idaho, a distance of about 450 miles, from Klamath Falls were Dr. and Mrs. A. Arisan of Chicago who reached the Hall at 11:50 p. m.

Both parties made the trip via Caldwell, Vale and over the John Day Highway to Dayville

where they cut across to Mitchell. It was at this point both parties paused to talk of the deplorable condition of the roads. Between Dayville and Mitchell, a distance of some 35 miles, both parties were forced to spend two hours, which cut considerable time off the record they perhaps could have made into this city.

Indian Pow-Wow To be Held Soon

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 18. (AP)—The third annual northwest Indian congress will be held here September 20, 21 and 22. It was announced today by Paul G. Wapato, president of the conference, following his return from two weeks of conferences with Indian leaders on the coast. A five minute speaking contest with a \$50 prize is to be held during the congress, with speakers chosen in elimination contests on the various reservations.

The dates were set during the week of the air derbies and the national air races here, in compliance with wishes of many of the Indians to witness them, Mr. Wapato said.
