He has seen worthy agricultural regions receive black eyes by land speculation, by land owners offering their land for sale at a stipulated price and then raising it at the time of sale.

Mr. Hill started for Pittsburgh, the home of Chief Justice Hall. A few minutes later it was discovered that Justice Hall was in Boston. Efforts to locate Mr. Hill failed.

The decision upheld the ruling of Judge Thayer that the motion for a new trial came too late because sentence had been pronounced.

"Neither the judge nor any of his associates had jurisdiction," the decision said, "to entertain the motion for a reversal of sentence."

CHARLESTOWN STATE PRISON, Boston, Aug. 19. (AP)—The statement that Bartolomeo Vanzetti had become insane was made by attorney Michael A. Musmanno today to Warden William Hendrey of the state prison after he had visited Vanzetti in his cell.

Upon leaving Vanzetti, Attorney Musmanno called newspaper men into Warden Hendrey's office, and with the warden present, said:

"Vanzetti took the news very badly. He kept shouting 'I knew it, I knew it. Get the million men who are making all that noise!'"

Vanzetti looks very badly Musmanno continued. "His mind is in an awful condition. He wants a wireless in his cell so that he can tell the story to the world."
