



## CHICAGO LEADS BY FIVE GAMES

Four Double Headers Played in National League

(By the Associated Press.) The National circuit sagged yesterday under four double headers, the Cubs dashing away with an equal break in Brooklyn, while everything was even with the Pirates and Giants as well as with the Cardinals and the Braves. Chicago's hold on first place is at five games over the Cubs.

Sheriff Blake handcuffed the Robins with five hits as his mates whitewashed Brooklyn for their twelfth shutout, 3 to 0. In the succeeding fracas, however, McWeeny eased Wigley's henchmen down with five safeties for a 6 to 1 verdict.

**Giants Batten.** Pittsburgh pummeled the Giants in the opening melee 3 to 2, and New York went back for the nightcap and won 5-2.

Kent Greenfield handed out only a pair of singles as Boston took the world champions into camp in the first part of a twin program 6 to 1 but behind Pitcher Sherdel the Cards made off with the after piece by the same score.

Cincinnati bumped the Phillies off twice by 5 to 3 in ten innings and 1 to 0.

**Yanks Licked.** Blankenship started off by squeaking for the White Sox by defeating the Yanks in the fourth and final clash of the series by 3 to 2.

Rube Walberg came through with a timely single in the eighth inning to drive in two runners for a 5 to 3 Philadelphia triumph over the Indians.

Wingard checked the Senators with six hits while St. Louis annexed its third straight by 6 to 1.

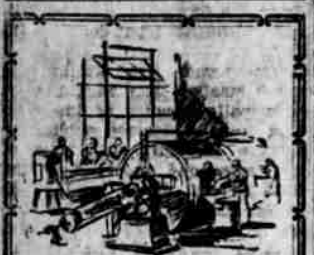
A double victory over the Red Sox by 5 to 2 and 14 to 7 pushed the Bengals to within one game of the second place Washington.

## CRATER MOVIES SHOWN AT LAKE

National Park During Dead of Winter Shown to Lodge Visitors

CRATER LAKE, Aug. 20.—Crater Lake, "The Land of Gay-ety" was the title given a moving picture shown in the lobby of the Crater Lake lodge by John Mabon recently.

These scenes were taken by Mr. Mabon during his long winter vigil as caretaker of the lodge and were laid out over the different high spots of the rim, and are entirely composed of beautiful scenes of Crater Lake, as it appears in all its snow white glory.

Although these pictures have been shown previously at the community house, this was the first attempt of Mr. Mabon to show them at the lodge, and as he was very successful, it is quite probable that they will be shown at least once a week for the entertainment of the guests.

**Taken in Winter.**

The first scenes were taken in February by Mr. Mabon as he made a trip to the Watchman on skis. Beautiful views, taken from high peaks on the rim show the lake in all its weird white beauty. The next views in order were of the lodge, taken March 15, showing drifts as high as 40 feet surrounding it.

On the lake side, "roof meets rim" in one big drift. These last views brought exclamations of surprise from the audience many of whom had been previously inclined to disbelieve the tales told of the great depth of the snow this last winter.

**Plans Showings.**

Mr. Mabon hopes to make arrangements to show these pictures of the lake at the community house which is a gathering place for the campers, and it is his wish that they will be so impressed by the pictures that they will carry away with them, not only the impression of Crater Lake as they have actually seen it, but also as they have seen it through the eyes of the moving picture machine.
