S. Elizabeth Foulke, a pioneer and one of the best known women in this state passed away suddenly this morning, August 20, at her residence at Gazette. Mrs. Foulke was born 30 years ago in Dixon, Illinois, and came to California in 1862. She was married in 1871 to Lewis M. Foulke, who until the time of his death in 1906 was very prominent in California history. At the time of Mrs. Foulke's death she was the President of the Edson Foulke Co., whose chief holdings are extensive ranch properties.

Mrs. Foulke was always very much interested in national, state and local politics as well as social welfare and school work. The funeral will be held at the family residence in Gazette on Tuesday afternoon, August 23.

Spry Promises Funds to Make Probe of Tin

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Aug. 22. (AP)—Financial assistance necessary to carry to a conclusion the government while metal investigations now under way here has been assured through the visit yesterday of William Spry, commissioner of the general land office at Washington.

"I have gone over the samples of the metal taken out and they look mighty good to me," declared the commissioner. "I am fairly well satisfied that you have a good thing here. You need financial assistance and we are prepared to give you such assistance as may be necessary. If you have anything here we want to help you get it. That is what the interior department is for—to develop resources."

Commissioner Spry, formerly governor of Utah for two terms, spent a day conferring with P. S. Boyer, division inspector, and H. W. Merrin and Horace Burritt, mineral inspectors, who are now engaged in making a thorough test of the southern Oregon white metal deposits.

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S. P. Doubles Speed on New Rail Project

Operations to double the speed of track lying along the line of the Nevada-California-Oregon railway Saturday were made when one of the crews near Alturas was moved back to a point between Madeline and Termino to begin laying steel, according to word received here today. With two crews in the field the steel will progress at the rate of four miles a day.

On the Wendell end of the line the track laying has progressed several miles past Havendale, while a stretch of some ten miles has been laid south of Madeline beginning at mile post 51. A steam shovel is reported working at Sukarlost tearing away at the banks there in readiness for laying steel. Surveying crews are working north of Surprise station and in Pitt river canyon. Preparations for a big railroad day celebration are being made by Alturas boosters and a gala day is in prospect. The event is planned for October first. Lakeview will participate in the celebration and in turn when the rails have reached here stage a similar big celebration.
