Famous Pioneer Called by Death

WAAWA WAAWA, Wash. Aug. 23 (AP)—William J. Scott, 85, a pioneer of the northwest died here last night as the result of a long attack of influenza. Mr. Scott was one of this valley's earliest citizens, coming here in 1862 to get supplies for the pioneers in the Grande Ronde valley in Oregon where the family settled from Iowa.

As a buckaroo freighter familiar with the entire northwest Mr. Scott moved here with his family in 1864. He was a freighter for 40 years between Kelton, Utah, and Boise, Idaho, Umatilla, Oregon, and Walla Walla, Boise and Helena, Mont.
