## FUTILE SEARCH IS CONTINUED

Even Rumors Virtually Cease; Green Flare Report Is Run Down

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 24.—More than a week after participants in the Dole air race from San Francisco Bay to Hawaii took off from Oakland's airport, the world was still awaiting word of the fate of six men and one woman who were lost in connection with this great adventure. Nothing has been heard from the planes since they faded forth over the Pacific early Tuesday afternoon August 16, although an occasional rumor served to raise hopes of their safety, only to dash them when it proved false.

Of the Dallas Spirit whose countless pilot and navigator left to seek the missing, no word has come since the dramatic SOS flashed across the waters when they went into a second tail spin, shortly after 9 o'clock, and crashed into the sea.

Seven destroyers, deployed across a 21-mile front, are continuing the well-nigh hopeless search along the great circle steamer lane between San Francisco and Honolulu. Land and sea planes despatched from the decks of the airplane carrier Langley and the aircraft tender Aroostock are scouting an 80-mile patch of sea and every effort is being made to trace down recurrent reports from land or ocean. The latest of these, a story that a green flare was seen to rise and die about 8,000 feet up the rugged slopes of Mauna Kea, in the island of Hawaii, Sunday night, had thus far failed to result in definite word that any of the fliers has been found.
