Let Us Show Them

A big outstanding proof of the bright future for Klamath Falls is the water for irrigation. It is plentiful and nature has reserved it high enough that gravity takes it over the land and makes it "blossom as a rose," to use an old poetical expression.

This evening the congressional delegation will be entertained by people of this city and at the dinner we will hear something of the policy toward irrigation in the West.

We realize that western congressmen have their troubles in getting reclamation bills through the national congress, for bear in mind, a great majority of the congressmen comprising the lower house are elected from states where irrigation is unknown and therefore they cannot well understand the problems of the west.

For this reason people on the Pacific slope appreciate most profoundly the excellent work done in the past for the reclamation or arid lands. In our district we have a man who has done valiant work for the irrigated districts and Congressman Nick Sinnott has been ably supported by Congressman Addison T. Smith, of Twin Falls, Idaho, and many others.

The Evening Herald wishes to impress upon this delegation, who are guests of the city this evening, that their long, tedious and seemingly endless fight in congress for the west is not overlooked by any means, but it is held firmly in the minds of our people, who thank them sincerely for their efforts.

We believe it is most gratifying, however, to these congressmen to come to a district like Klamath Falls and see achievement; see their promises to the national congress made good by people on the land; see a desert turned into productive homes. We can think of nothing that better backs up a public official than for him to be able to say to his colleagues, "we told you what we would do if you approved our reclamation bills and now there has proven our statements to be true."

That is the backing Klamath Basin is giving the work of the delegation who visits us this evening; that is the thanks we are offering the reclamation department for its effort, and that is the proof we are giving the entire nation that the faith of Sinnott and others has been sound.

And to this delegation we wish to say further that we have barely started on the high road to agricultural success. Come back in five years, friends of the west, and we will show you such development that you can scarcely realize possible. We know it is in the offing. We know because we are here on the land and can better understand conditions, that a few years more will make of this Klamath Basin an irrigated homeland the like of which has yet never been known in all the world, because we have the wide expanses yet to be developed; we have water in abundance; we have the proper climate, and we have the home market, together with the entire market area of the Pacific coast.

Klamath Falls and the entire community is today thankful to a generous government and to the congressmen who have gone a long way and undertaken big federal investment to start an empire which will now be brought into full bearing by the sturdy men and women who want to call it home.

WORD LACKING OF LONE PILOT

This information remains unconfirmed.

Scarcity of news was not translated into alarm, however, for the course that Redfern laid out carried him over virtually trackless seas and land. Continued silence will not become portent of danger until the hour of his planned arrival has passed—early tonight if he flies to Rio de Janeiro, or near noon today if low fuel supply or another cause prompts him to swerve eastward to Pernambuco, on the coast.

One further contingency would land him at Para, northwest of Pernambuco and almost 1500 miles directly north of Rio de Janeiro, the major objective of the daring pilot who catapulted into space from Glynn Isle, near here, at noon Thursday. Para was his intended landing place if adverse winds and weather forced too rapid consumption of fuel in the opinion of Paul J. Varner, chairman of the local committee sponsoring the flight.

Radio stations, ships and light houses sprinkled on and near his southeasterly route across the equator are alert to his voyage and plan to flash to the world the first news they have of Redfern or his plane. Amateur wireless operators throughout the southeast, as well as operators of powerful government and commercial stations are keyed up and listening in for the slightest bit of information concerning the pilot's whereabouts.

Adding to the general belief that Redfern will attain at least his secondary objective Pernambuco, are reports of government meteorologists, that he will encounter favorable weather conditions through practically all of his trans-equatorial jump, and especially over those dubious stretches of the lower Atlantic and the Caribbean Sea, whose treacherous reaches he has traversed already if his program of

flight met no unforeseen mischance.

By his pre-flight computations Redfern today should be over the northeastern part of Brazil, already across Dutch Guiana and blazing a new aerial high road over the high mountain ranges.

Indicating that the public be becoming more careful in this respect. This is not true of the smokers' fires, however, and a special effort is being made this year throughout the Pacific northwest to call attention to the damage being done by dropping clear and cigarette butts while they are lighted.

Only one arrest for violation of the forest fire laws has been made on the Crater forest this year. In this case the accused, C. C. Burroughs, of North Carolina, was traced by means of an auto crank which he left near his unextinguished cigarette, and by tracks made by him and his wife and dog. He was located near Crescent Lake, where he plead guilty in the justice of peace court for leaving a fire burning unattended on forest ground and was fined \$25 and costs.

100 MILES OF TIES NOW LAID

H. McCarthy in a telephonic interview this morning.

Ties and steel for the Alturas-Lakeview section, a distance of 54 miles, are now enroute and will be distributed as fast as they arrive. Provision will be made for a transfer track at Alturas as soon as the new steel is laid to that point, a plan which will permit of the release of much narrow gauge equipment. Crews engaged in the work now number over 600 men, the largest number that has yet been held together at one time. The labor turnover appears to be lessening, where for a time replacement

ments hardly kept pace with laborers leaving.

A big four-yard steam shovel to operate from the standard gauge line will arrive this week to widen cuts and tear away embankments along the lower part of the line. While ballasting will continue actively, this operation will not delay operation of standard gauge trains since schedules can be maintained over the line as soon as the rails are in place, though, necessarily on a slow schedule.

McCormick Deering Potato Diggers

A Few Reasons Why These Diggers Make Friends Wherever They Go:

It takes real stamina to enable a machine to stand up to the hard work of digging potatoes. The McCormick-Deering digger has a frame built of heavy angle-steel bars. The sides are made of heavy steel plates. The whole frame is solidly braced to resist excessive strain.

The beams are made of extra heavy I-beam steel. There is ample clearance under the beams for vines and trash. There is also good clearance between the tongue-truck axle and the ground.

The elevator links are made of seven-sixteenths inch high carbon steel, which is very hard. The links are tempered to give best gearing qualities. They are arranged to form pockets to keep the potatoes from rolling back down the elevator.
