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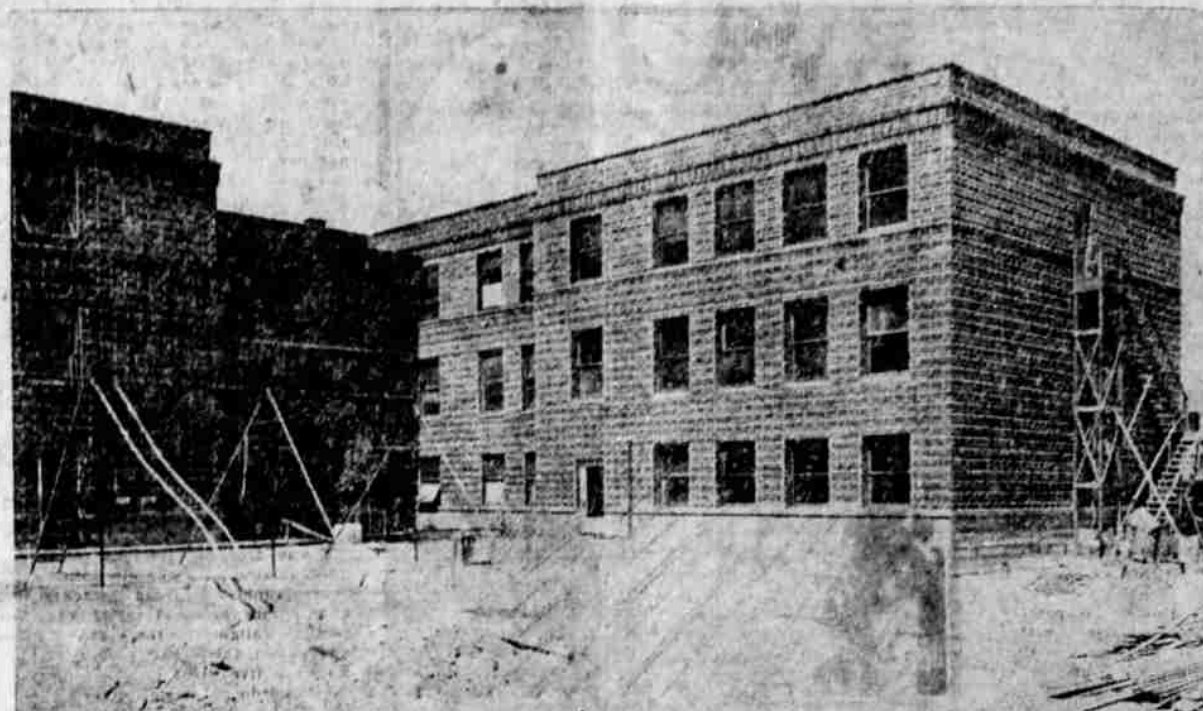

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Sacred Heart Academy—A Remarkable School



When back in 1917 the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth of Kentucky came to Klamath Falls and leased the Shive residence at the corner of 7th and Pine streets, even the most optimistic little dreamed that in the short space of time that has since elapsed it would have grown into the magnificent institution it is today. The little group of four Sisters has grown to fourteen and the handful of pupils to upwards of three hundred. The grade school has grown into an accredited high, the graduates from which have made records wherever they have gone that is a credit to their alma mater. Music, oil and china painting and other departments have been

added, until today it is possible for parents to secure for their children educational advantages that heretofore called for their travel to distant cities. The leased property has grown into an investment of approximately \$150,000.

One of Largest.

This in brief is the history of Sacred Heart academy—the today's largest Catholic academy in the state outside of Portland and that bids fair to step into the lead in a much shorter space of time than it has required to place it in the enviable position it occupies today.

The growth of the institution made it necessary last year to use the building formerly occu-

plied by Sacred Heart church. To avoid this during the coming school year an addition 44x77, three stories, was erected and will be ready for occupancy when the school term opens next Monday. Four additional class rooms will be available on the first and second floors and on the third floor a well-equipped, completely furnished modern dormitory will be ready for boys under fourteen years of age. The contract for this addition was let to Philippen and Huls, general contractors of this city, who made the remarkable record of completing the structure in 48 working days, which probably stands as a record in this city. Cooperating with them were the following in-

dividuals and firms, who either furnished the material or handled the sub-contracts:

The structure followed the same lines of the main building, Salem tile being used. The class

Building News

Work on the fair grounds building is fast nearing completion and Tuesday evening will find the building open for inspection.

Perhaps no building in the city has been rushed to completion more rapidly than this one, which was started not more than four weeks ago. The building takes in a space 75x150 feet plus four towers.

H. R. Perrin is the architect for the building.

The frame work on the basement and first story of the First Methodist church has been completed and the first of the week will find the second story under construction. Work on the beautiful edifice is progressing rapidly and every attempt is being made to have it well under way before the approach of stormy weather.

H. R. Perrin, local architect, drew the plans for the church which will rank among the most beautiful in the entire state.

Construction of a 20-foot road bed through the Linkville cem-

etry has been started and by the middle of the coming week should be completed. The road is of macadam and is being constructed by the W. D. Miller Construction company.

The brick or stone fireplace that so often adorns a summer cottage may be made much more efficient if a circulation of the air in the room can be established. A friend has worked out an effective device. His fireplace sets out into the room about two and one-half feet from the wall. Through the lower part of the neck of the smoke flue he

has placed old three or four inch boiler flues as the end openings are flush with the outer wall of the fireplace on each end. The flames play over these flues and draw the air from the room through them.

Two fireplaces built exactly alike, except that one has the flues and the other does not, give strikingly different heating results. The one with the flues gives results almost equal to a stove, and the room is evenly heated. The usual drafts incident to fireplace heating are absent where this simple device is used.

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
