Pocol, also, will appear before Police Judge Lem L. Garbagen today.

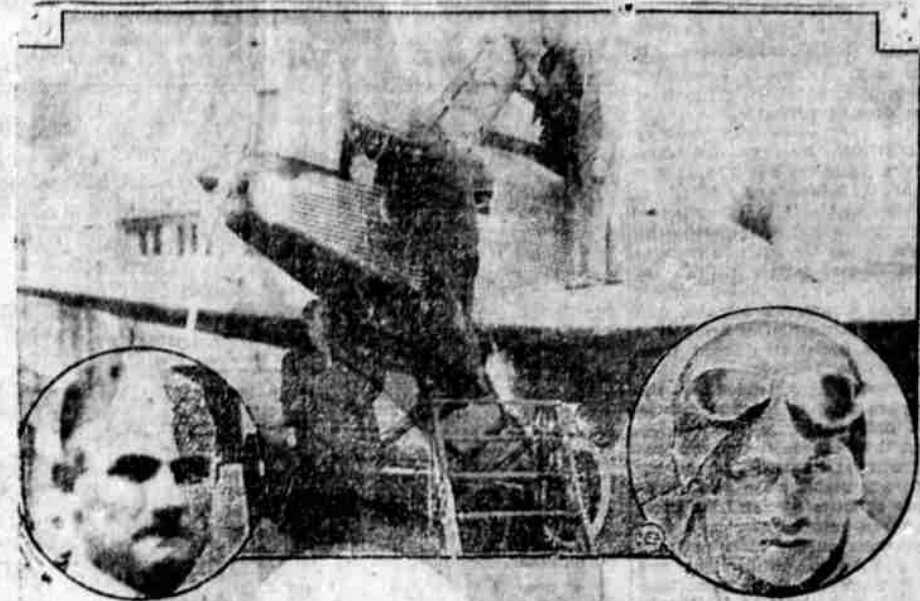
