

CHARLES LEVINE HIRES ANOTHER

United States from France, but that he intended to pay Drouhin 100,000 francs and dissolve their contract.

The owner of the Columbia explained that he desired a pilot who did not expect perfect conditions for his attempt to fly across the ocean, adding: "I've been trying to get Drouhin to take off for America, but he is unwilling to take a chance without perfect weather."

Amazed at Daring
While opinions differ respecting the manner in which Levine quit France in defiance of air navigation regulations, most commentators are amused at the cool daring of his exploit, and some surprise is expressed that it did not end in tragedy.

Paris reports say his take off was splendid, but his landing at Croydon, according to the air-drome staff, was as near disaster as it could be. These officials had a bad shock when they learned that Levine was on the way and feared trouble knowing his flying experience was limited. When he came over the field and they saw his hesitating circles before landing, they rushed an ambulance and fire engine on the field, fearing a crash would end the maneuvers.

Plane Rounds
Captain Muir, director of the flying service survey, who watched the arrival, said he was frightened when he saw how the plane was acting. After circling four times at a height of 100 to 500 feet, Levine tried to land, but the wheels hit the earth at such a pace that the machine bounded fifty feet. Levine, however, was able to accelerate the engine and rose 100 feet. Eventually he made a clumsy but safe landing. Later he declared he was unable to see what the Croydon airmen were worried about, saying it was "an ordinary, every day bread and butter show."

PARIS, Aug. 29. (AP)—Mrs. Charles A. Levine, acting for her husband, who flew his trans-Atlantic monoplane Columbia to London yesterday, went to Le Bourget field today and paid Maurice Drouhin the 100,000 francs due him under the terms of the contract by which he was to have piloted Levine across the Atlantic.

The French aviator took the money, saying "I accept it because I have not the courage to argue any more."

Mrs. Levine told the pilot she regretted very much that her husband had decided not to fly to America with him, but she added, nobody could tell what Mr. Levine was going to do until he had done it.

August 27-28—Harbor Grace to Croydon, England, distance 2350 miles; flying time 23 1-3 hours.
August 29—Croydon to Munich, Germany, distance 600 miles; flying time about seven hours.
August 30—Munich to Belgrade, Jugo Slavia, distance 500 miles; flying time 5 1/2 hours.
Total distance 3450 miles or about one-seventh the circumference of the globe. Previous record 28 days and 14 hours, around the world, held by Wells and Evans who were still on Atlantic steamer on fourth day.
