

STATE SUPREME COURT IS BACK

Three Written Opinions and Many Oral Orders Handed Down Today

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 31, (A.P.)—Returning to work after a vacation of about six weeks the supreme court yesterday handed down three written opinions and numerous oral orders. The opinions were:

W. G. Fordham, appellant, vs. Carey S. Stearns, appeal from Deschutes county; appeal from judgment dismissing case arising out of election of school treasurer. Opinion by Justice Brown, Judge Walter H. Evans affirmed.

Peter Hauglan and C. F. Anderson, doing business as Anderson and Hauglan vs. Mt. Hood Woodlands company, defendant and appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; action to recover money for services. Opinion by Justice Rand, Judge Walter H. Evans affirmed.

Austin Osborn vs. Mary H. Deane, administratrix of estate of Elton DeForce, deceased; and E. P. Parker and James Bremser, appellants; appeal from Clatsop county; objection to cost bill denied in opinion by Justice Coslow.



250 Tourists Shivering on Alaska Beach

JUNEAU, Alaska, Aug. 31. (A.P.)—More than 250 tourists—refugees from the leaking and disabled coastwise liner Princess Charlotte—shivered early this morning on a bleak and wind-swept Alaskan beach while a score of vessels steamed under forced draught to their aid.

Radio advices received here said that the stranded tourists, among them many wealthy residents of the United States and Canada, were landed from the Princess Charlotte at midnight when the vessel was refloated after striking a rock in treacherous Wrangell narrows of southeastern Alaska.

A jagged hole, said radio reports, was torn in the prow of the Charlotte. Although the danger seemed in no immediate view of sinking, it appeared advisable to land the passengers on the unsheltered beach, more than 20 miles from the nearest village.

At the time of the mishap the big steamer was returning to Vancouver, B. C., from Skagway, Alaska. SOS signals sent out shortly after the vessel struck the rocks at 9 o'clock last night were answered by tugs, cannery boats and three fast government cutters, which set out to the aid of the stricken steamer and its shipwrecked passengers.

Seek Permission To Build Power Line in County

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 31. (A.P.)—J. C. Thompson of the California Oregon Power company and W. C. Van Emon, Klamath Falls, of the Wood River Power company, appeared before the state highway commission yesterday each asking the right of way to construct a pole line for power wire along the Dalles-California highway from the Klamath Agency to Anna Creek saw mill.

The commission made it plain that any permit granted for a pole line must contain a joint-use clause. The matter was referred to the commission's attorney for advice.

President Listens Attentively to Delegation from Northwest

RAPID CITY, S. D., Aug. 31. (A.P.)—Careful study of the proposed Columbia river basin reclamation project in Washington State was promised by President Coolidge today to a group of western citizens who called to explain the proposal.

Mr. Coolidge understands the Columbia river project would cost more than \$100,000,000 and while he favors such propositions in a general way he made it clear today that he would like more information on this gigantic undertaking.

As a general rule, the president would like to see such developments proceed as fast as funds from the reclamation work would permit.

He listened attentively to the delegation from the far northwest.
