### Cattlemen Warned About Production

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6. (U.P.)—With cattlemen showing more optimism because of gradually improving conditions and an unusually favorable season during 1927, there is a tendency to increase production and all producers are warned not to overstock if a continuation of good market conditions is to be maintained, according to Hubbard Russell, managing director of the Western Cattle Marketing association.

"Despite a reported shortage of cattle in the middle west, coast areas and states adjoining California have not experienced a marked decrease in available slaughter cattle. During the present season, 150,000 more cattle have been available for market in California than in 1925 and there has been a tendency for production to increase each year during the last five years," Russell declares.

"Beef production is beginning to be profitable and with the return of favorable marketing conditions, range and breeding areas may be restored with the result that the number of cattle in the western states may be greatly increased. An increase of any sizeable proportions must inevitably be followed by a prolonged period of relatively low prices and generally unfavorable conditions; therefore, cattlemen must maintain steady production at a point about equal to that of the last two years if favorable conditions are to be maintained," Russell states.

### SCHOOL TEACHER FEELS ROYAL SIAM ELEPHANTS

SIENANDOH, La., Sept. 5. (AP)—The royal white elephants of the King of Siam like to be treated like circus elephants, according to Miss Ella M. Murphy of Shenandoah, who has combined school teaching with show trotting.

She stopped in Siam on a circuit of the world and, lacking peanuts, said she fed the king's elephants bits of sugar cane and tossed them coins to pick up.

Buying what purported to be a hair from the tail of one of the animals, Miss Murphy had it inflated with acid and made into an elephant ring, highly prized by natives. It is supposed to give its wearer courage and strength.

Miss Murphy formerly taught in Pekin University. She has visited the Malay States, India, Egypt, Palestine, Honolulu, Japan, Korea, Manchuria and Europe.

### FREIGHTER PLOWS THROUGH BIG DOCK

ASTORIA, Sept. 6. (U.P.)—Damage estimated at \$15,000 was done here when a dock was wrecked and a warehouse demolished.

The freighter "West Nazaria" plowed into the pier for nearly 200 feet. Apparently something was wrong with the steering apparatus of the vessel. No one was injured.

### SUGGESTS \$5 DIVORCE

CHICAGO, Sept. 5.—With Chicago divorce court dockets so crowded that investigation of the cases is impossible, Judge Joseph R. David suggests a law permitting divorces to anyone at a flat rate of \$5. As it is today, he says, "the man cheats the wife; the wife cheats the husband; they both cheat the children and conspire to cheat the judge. So why run up the courts with fraudulent divorces?"
