GIANTS CLIMB CLOSE TO TOP

Pittsburgh's lead at the top of the National stood at only one half game today, and the New York Giants, the only club among the four contenders to be idle yesterday, gained more ground in the dash pennantward.

Chicago's Cubs and the world's champion Cardinals came to grips again at St. Louis and the net result was a standstill. Frank House held the Bruins in check in the first game of a double header and St. Louis won 6-2. Sheriff Blake gave the Cards only seven hits in the second game and beat them 8-4. St. Louis, in breaking even, held third place over the Cubs.

The Pirates bowed again to Cincinnati. Red Lucas had the better of Carmen Hill, ace of Pittsburgh's pitching staff, and emerged with a 6-5 decision.

The Brooklyn Robins and the Phillies engaged in a double header with honors even. In the opener Melvin's men hammered in three runs in the ninth to win, 3-2. Jumbo Elliott, Brooklyn's ponderous southpaw led his team to a 9-1 win in the second.

Babe Ruth again was the whole show in the American league. The Yankee slugger hit two home runs and ran his total for the season up to 49. The Yanks needed all the hitting they could produce, for they had to hustle to beat out the Boston Red Sox, 12-10.

DEMPSEY WILL START BOXING

LINCOLN FIELDS, CRETE, Ill., Sept. 8. (P)—Four days of hard work with the gloves are ahead of Jack Dempsey, after a 48 hour lay off from all training. Only newspapermen will be admitted to these workouts, starting today. Manager Flynn has ruled. Some new sparring partners—light fast men—have been called upon, though their names have not been announced.

Dempsey said he weighed exactly 200 pounds, after his two-day rest, and never felt better.

He hopes to shed about six pounds in the coming fortnight, to enter the ring around 193 or 194.

There was a noticeable elation in the Dempsey camp over the accident which laid open a gash in Gene Tunney's eyebrow. Manager Flynn called it "a break in our favor," adding that "fighters should take advantage of all the breaks."

Dempsey made no comment on the "break" but there was a grim look on his face as he recalled, doubtless, the cuts around his own optics a year ago in the battle of the Sequoy.

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led over Ruth within the next month, would it affect Ruth's play to general and also that of the Yankees?

How much truth is there to the oft made statement that as Ruth goes, so go the Yankees?

How does the public and players view the struggle between the pretender for the crown and the king?

These are just a few of the questions, inspired by the battle between Ruth and Gehrig, that have been asked at me recently. Here is my angle on the various queries.

Gehrig May Set Record.

Unquestionably Gehrig has an excellent chance to beat the Babe for the home-run championship of 1927. However, I won't believe it has actually happened until I see it in figures.

Ruth has the habit of rising to the occasion and I am sure he will not go down to defeat without putting up a titanic struggle. Don't count the Babe until the curtain has been rung down.

Gehrig has been far more successful on the Yankee Stadium than Ruth this year. Since a majority of the remaining games of the New York Americans are at home, this is a decided advantage to Gehrig.

I doubt if either Ruth or Gehrig come even close to breaking Ruth's record of 59. It strikes me that 59 home runs will come.

Questions on Yankees.

With the New York Yankees far out in front, the most interesting feature of the American League race at present, is the hectic struggle being waged between Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig for the home run championship.

What are Gehrig's chances to beat Ruth to the honor? Is there a possibility that either of the two will beat Ruth's record of 59 home runs made in 1921?

Should Gehrig assume a big

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The Modern Method of Roasting Meat to Perfection



Wipe the meat with a damp cloth, place in a dripping pan or double roaster, dust with salt, pepper and flour, allowing from one to two tablespoons of flour to sit on the bottom of the pan, and put in a hot oven; 375 to 400 degrees F. to brown. This takes from fifteen to twenty minutes. Pour a little hot water into the pan containing two or three tablespoons Mazola and one-half tablespoon of Karo, Blue Label. Baste the meat with this every fifteen minutes, until done. Make a gravy from the drippings in the pan, adding a cup of boiling water to each half cup of drippings. If necessary, thicken the gravy with a little Argo or Kingford's Cornstarch blended with cold water.

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might close to winning the swat championship of 1927.

Ruth's 59 home runs made in 1921 is one of the few baseball records that should remain unbroken through many years. It has a good chance of holding up as long as the game is played under present conditions.

A Few Answers.

There are some who believe that if Gehrig takes a commanding lead over Ruth, making it seem certain there is no chance to overtake him, the Babe will become careless.

While such a thing is a possibility, should Gehrig get a lead of from five to 10 home runs, I don't look for such a situation, simply because I do not believe he will ever get that far away from Ruth.

Granting he does, also that Ruth's play suffers because of carelessness, there is no doubt

that it will seriously handicap the Yankees. There is much truth in the saying that as Ruth goes, so go the Yankees.

However, Ruth likes his baseball so well that I am inclined to think intuition would cause him to put forth his best effort regardless of how strong Gehrig is going.

The public is unquestionably with Gehrig. The underdog always has the sympathy and best wishes of common people. And while Gehrig is just as popular with the players as Ruth, it is my thought most of them would

prefer to see Ruth finish in front. Their motive is purely a selfish one. They know what a great magnet Ruth is at the gate and Gehrig's drawing power as the home run king would remain to be established. Babe and his home runs have boosted salaries for every one connected with the game.

I feel the American League Home Run Derby is going to prove a whale of a battle between the game's premier sluggers, Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig, to the final game of the season.

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
