(Continued from page one) to Omura. The navy's announcement said bad weather still was detaining them today.

At Kasumigaura, 45 miles northeast of Tokyo, an enthusiastic reception awaited Brock and Schless. The navy has made every possible arrangement there for their comfort and convenience.

New Motor Ready. J. V. Walker, Tokyo representative of the flight, has 550 gallons of gasoline at the field for the plane and a new motor at Yokohama if they want it.

Whether the motor is wanted or not may depend largely on the plans announced by the Americans after arriving here. Friends are trying to dissuade them from attempting the flight across the Pacific. They told the Associated Press yesterday they intended to tackle it. They are now 15 days out of Harbor Grace, N. F., their starting point. They have ten and a half days more to break the record for circling the globe. Unless they fly across the Pacific they can't make it.
