Miss Edna Kerns, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Kerns of the Keno highway, has chosen the University of Oregon for her college work.

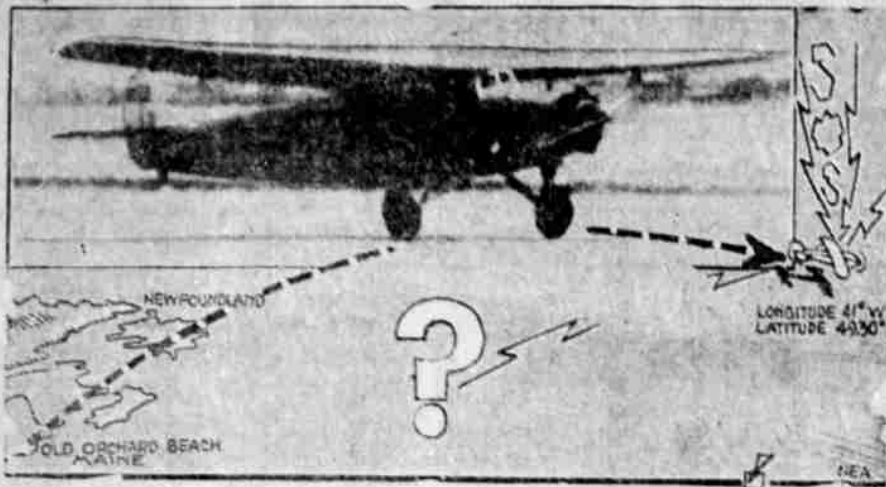
Hill to Oregon

of abating, we deem it necessary to issue warning to the public.

"We are positive that the disease is communicable and therefore urge that all parents shall prevent children under 15 years of age from leaving their homes except when in family automobiles traveling in the country.

"We recommend that children under 15 years of age be not permitted to visit stores or theatres or congregate in any way. In other words, the seriousness of this situation demands that these recommendations be followed, and all children under 15 years of age must be kept on their own premises except when traveling in the country with their parents in their own machines. No visiting back and forth shall be permitted and under no consideration must children be permitted to enter any theatre or store or be upon the streets."
