



Five Mile Hike Ends Tunney's Fight Training

LAKE VILLA CRETE, Ill., Sept. 21. (UP)—T five-mile hike Wednesday morning over the hilly roads and lanes of Cedar Crest Country club here marked the end of Gene Tunney's training for his bout with Jack Dempsey.

The champion will leave his training quarters Thursday morning for Chicago.

Wednesday night he will remain in camp, choosing to spend the eve of his title defense bout in the company of close friends gathered around the cozy grate fire which in Tunney's stay here has come to be his favorite lounging spot.

Tunney ran 8 miles Tuesday and worked for five rounds of five minutes each on the light and heavy punching bags. His speed was noticeably increased as he lent every effort toward finishing off his final training workout.

For two rounds the champion peppered the light bag, beating a steady tattoo of rights and lefts. Twelve lightning rights crashed the much abused bag for a finale to Gene's light bag workout.

Left and right jabs in a one-two series, that would have spelled defeat for many an aspiring contender, were aimed at the heavy bag.

Leading Pirates Are Slowing Down

Odds on Champ But Many Fans Bet on Dempsey

CHICAGO, Sept. 21. (UP)—The odds were on Gene Tunney but the money was backing Jack Dempsey at betting commissions' offices here today.

Odds on the champion shortened from 7 to 5 to 6 to 5, under the influence of Dempsey money coming in from middle-western and Pacific coast followers of the former titleholder, and Tunney money was scarce at the price.

There were indications that the fighters would go to the ring side with the betting even, although some observers, remembering that the Tunney backers did not begin to put out their money in quantity at Philadelphia last year until the day before the fight, expressed confidence that enough supporters of the champion would appear Thursday to keep him the favorite.

(Continued from page 1) colorful ex-champion, Dempsey, plus the showmanship of Tex Rickard, that has "built up" this record-breaking event. The fond hopes of the New York promoter that he will stage his first \$2,000,000 battle does not seem likely to be realized but an attendance of probably 150,000 and receipts estimated as likely to reach \$2,750,000 will shatter all previous records for boxing or any other sports spectacle of modern times.

Tunney still is convinced that he is the "man of destiny" so far as the heavyweight crown is concerned. The handsome champion, pronounced by experts, at his camp to be boxing with more speed and accuracy than a year ago when he mastered Dempsey in every department of the game, hopes to remove all doubt about his rulership by scoring a knockout.

Dempsey Improved. Dempsey, also declared to be in the peak of condition, from 50 to 75 percent improved over his 1926 form, is equally as sure in putting the crowning touch to a comeback that no ex-champion of the heavyweights have achieved. Dempsey and his adherents are confident that he has regained his old punch and the "crusher" of his Firpo battle.

They declare him on fighting edge, as a result of his victory over Jack Sharkey two months ago, and faster afoot, as well as more accurate in his punching, than he was against the Boston heavyweight in New York.

There seems no question that Dempsey mentally and physically, is in vastly better condition than in 1926. But whether, at his age, he has come back far enough to battle on even terms or turn the tables of the man who whipped him so decisively 12 months ago remains to be seen.

Chess Ambassador Appointed in Cuba

HAVANA, Cuba, Sept. 21. (U. P.)—J. R. Capablanca today was appointed Cuba's chess ambassador to the world.

President Machado signed a decree appointing Capablanca a diplomatic representative at large, with no fixed post but a liberal traveling allowance, so that he can attend international chess matches.

Capablanca now is engaged in defending his world championship title at Buenos Aires, against Alekhine, the Franco-Russian challenger.

Filipinos Want to Help Select Ruler

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21. (UP)—President Coolidge will be asked to consider the wishes of the Filipino people in selecting a governor general to succeed Leonard Wood, when the resident commissioner of the Philippines, Pedro Guevara, calls at the White House tomorrow.

The Filipinos desire to make their views known directly to the president, preferably by the visit here of a Filipino delegation, but in any case through their constitutional representative. Guevara probably will indicate to the president the acceptability of several different aspirants for the post.

Nimrods Eager To See Season Open

Nimrods, eager to try their luck for Chinese Pheasants as well as ducks are anxiously awaiting the approach of Saturday, October first.

An open season has been declared on ducks, except wood ducks and elder ducks, geese, rails, coots, Wilson snipe or jack-snipe and greater and lesser yellowlegs, from October first to January fifteenth.

No open season on sage hens and prairie chickens will be allowed until 1930 in the state of Oregon, so hunters are warned to know their birds before they shoot.

Blue or sooty grouse, ruffed grouse or native pheasant, with a bag limit of four of any or all such birds in one day, or eight in any seven consecutive days will be on the shooting list from September 10 to October 20.

Open season for mountain or plumed California or valley quail in Klamath and Deschutes counties will be from October 15 to October 31.

BILLY EVANS Says

MORE ABOUT ALTRONK To a majority of the present-day fans, Nick Altronk is known only as the baseball clown who makes the folks laugh with his pantomime comedy.

Years ago Nick was one of the game's greatest southpaws. There never was a more serious pitcher. He took to clowning after he lost his effectiveness.

After passing through the majors, Altronk took a whirl at the American Association with varying success. When I asked him why he quit the minors and went to coaching and clowning, he replied in his characteristic manner:

"The bats they used in that league were simply too big for me. I couldn't throw the ball past 'em."

Altronk, as a star, was known as a smart pitcher. He didn't have a world of stuff, but he used every ounce of it to advantage. He worked much after the manner of Herb Pennock of the Yankees and had about the same repertoire.

Nick will neither affirm nor deny a story that in the ninth inning of a tight game he passed three batters rather than give them a chance to hit and in turn

picked each one of them off first base to retire the side.

Assets of Great Pitcher On Aug. 2, the day Washington fans paid tribute to the twentieth anniversary of Walter Johnson as a big league pitcher and a member of that club, I sat on the bench with Altronk, discussing Walter and his remarkable career.

Naturally we talked of the great speed Johnson had when he broke in, of his unanny control for a fast-ball pitcher, as well as many of the remarkable feats he had performed, such as shutting the New York club out in three consecutive games, pitching 54 consecutive innings without losing scored on, registering more than 100 shut-outs and so on down the line.

These things brought up the question as to what makes a great pitcher—which is the most important asset?

Some argue that natural ability is the greatest asset, others will insist natural ability means nothing without control, many will tell you a good fast ball is most important, while quite a few rate a good change of pace as most necessary of all things.

Nick listened to the discussion of several of us and then in one of his serious moments, which are few, now that he is supposed to clown it for the edification of fandom, he threw new light on the pitching situation.

ALTRONK GIVES VIEWS "Walter Johnson is the great-

est pitcher the game has ever known because he possesses the ideal disposition for a hurler.

"True, Johnson had a world of stuff, but the proper mental attitude is what enabled him to reach the dizzy position he now holds in baseball.

"One cannot be a great pitcher unless he has the right disposition. No player who ever wore a Washington uniform can recall the slightest criticism from Johnson no matter how poorly he played. No umpire can ever remember his protesting a decision.

"Johnson throughout his career has accepted the good and bad breaks in the same methodical manner. Nothing has ruffled him. No matter how things were breaking he always continued to give his best.

"I can name 25 pitchers in the American League today who would be twice as efficient if they weren't crabs, sulking every time a team-mate makes a costly

error or they believe the umpire has kicked one.

"Whatever fame I attained as a pitcher was due more to my disposition than my stuff. I let the umpires umpire and knew every one of my teammates was doing his best."
