EWAUNA BRIDGE WORK STARTING

Work on the Great Northern bridge across Lake Ewauna started this morning with a small crew of men lining out material preparatory to driving piling for the new structure which is to give G. N. trains access to terminal facilities on the west side of the lake.

Fred A. Crichton, superintendent of construction for Hausor Brothers Construction company which holds contract for building the bridge and which is now also engaged in building the G. N. extension from Bend to Chemult, arrived in this city yesterday to start the bridge work. He was unable to state today just when the structure will be completed.

Several carloads of material is now on location along the lake shore, and with test piling already driven by the Sawmill Engineering & Construction company some time ago, the work is scheduled to proceed rapidly, Crichton stated.

Clerk Harding, resident G. N. engineer, is in charge of engineering details on the bridge.

Crichton today declared that local labor will be largely used on the bridge and that crews will be materially increased once the work is well underway.

Today Is Opening of Autumn Season
