Sex of the Baby Got Twisted in Records But Nature Knew

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 21. (A.P.)—The Fairview Park hospital "baby puzzle" has been solved and the smiling infant girl whose identity has been drawn into dispute, is Mrs. Sam Smith's own child, officials of the hospital are convinced.
With the return to the hospital of Miss Ruth Meyer, a nurse who assisted in delivering Mrs.

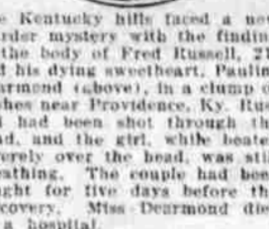
Smith's child, everything has been explained, Phillip Vollmer, Jr., superintendent of the hospital said. Miss Meyer returned last night from a vacation.
Vollmer said he is ready to go into court Thursday with the testimony of Miss Meyer that she recalls distinctly the baby was a girl but that in the stress of the moment following its birth she became excited and told the family physician, Dr. J. A. Reutenik, it was a boy.
Dr. Reutenik was not present at the birth, arriving ten minutes afterward.
Miss Meyer may be the chief witness for the hospital in the habeas corpus action which Mr. and Mrs. Sam Smith filed against officials of the institution to compel them to return their son "George."
Although she has been nursing the infant girl, Mrs. Smith has refused to leave the hospital until she is convinced she has her own child. She has insisted a

RARE ROW IS ON IN CITY FIGHT

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 21. (A.P.)—The strength of the republican organization in Philadelphia under the leadership of senator-elect Wm. S. Vare, was again put to the test today at the primary election for the nomination of candidates for mayor and other municipal and county officers.
Under the guidance of a band of ward leaders, most of whom are Vare followers, the organization has been in control of political affairs of this city for years.
Basing his campaign on a declaration against "a s. a. g. rule" former Mayor J. Hampton Moore, independent candidate for the republican majority nomination, claims to have aroused unusual public interest and predicts victory for the independents. Mr. Moore pointed to the record-breaking registration of more than 500,000 voters, which, he asserted, was due to an "aroused citizenship."

Supporters of Harry A. Mackey, city treasurer and campaign manager for Senator-elect Vare, the organization candidate for mayor, predicted his nomination by an overwhelming majority.
More than 600 persons are believed to have been poisoned by an Italian woman named Toffana, who lived in the 17th century. She was apprehended and executed.
The Kentucky hills faced a new murder mystery with the finding of the body of Fred Russell, 21, and his dying sweetheart, Pauline Dearmond (above), in a clump of bushes near Providence, Ky. Russell had been shot through the head, and the girl, while beaten severely over the head, was still breathing. The couple had been sought for five days before the discovery. Miss Dearmond died at a hospital.
