Lemon-Yellow Grid Warriors Meet Pacific Eleven Today

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 1. (AP)—Final preparations of the University of Oregon football team for its second game of the season on Hayward field today against Pacific University, were completed last night by Captain John J. McEwan, head Westcott coach.

In an effort to make sure that the Oregonians would put up a much longer game than a week ago, and also to stage a comeback over the last the Pacific eleven has ever had, Coach McEwan sent his charges through a light but snappy signal drill and sent them around the field on the dead run before sending them in to the dressing room. The Westcotts were not put through a stiff warm-up but allowed only to warm up and go through the plays to be used today.

Stiff Resty Oregon is far from a mechanical eleven that walks through its plays with precision, but it is

just taking shape. The Badger eleven today will give McEwan a chance to really size up his men and place them according to ability displayed under fire. As yet he has not chosen a first team, but after today some semblance of a regular eleven will be forthcoming. At the Westcotts meet the University of Idaho team here next week. The meeting will have to work fast. The game today will start at 2:50 o'clock, according to announcement of Jack W. Benefield, graduate manager.

(Continued from page 1) One part of damaged buildings. Overlapping walls were the principal menace. Six hundred more men and sixty additional trucks were added to the army of men sent by the department of streets and sewers to restore streets for traffic. Authorities warned eight sets away.

All last night members of the Sixth Infantry U. S. Army detachment, a contingent of the Missouri national guard and the American Legion, supplementing the St. Louis police force, patrolled the storm zone, in darkness. The storm had splintered poles, snapped standards and shattered \$30,000 worth of street lights. They were prepared to shoot at marauders but evildoers were none seen.

Red Cross Helps Relief was in charge of the Red Cross. The St. Louis Globe Democrat and the Post Dispatch headed the relief fund with contributions of \$5,000 each.

Rehabilitation already started, has its bright side. Work for skilled and unskilled labor is promised in abundance. Between 40,000 and 60,000 men have been idle here this summer. Brick layers, carpenters, roofers and plumbers in great numbers were at work today.
