

Strange Celebration Staged By Klamath River Indians In Recognizing New Year

SOMES BAR, Oct. 1.—The Indians near Somes Bar have commenced their celebration of Picnic last Saturday. This is an annual event to celebrate the Indian new year.

The middle of last week the Indians began preparing for the celebration, which is held at Cot-te-Mean, near the Sugar Loaf at the mouth of the Klamath and Salmon rivers.

The medicine man has to be in the sweat house without eating or drinking any water for two days, and has to make long hikes up the different mountains. After the first two days he can eat once a day but is not allowed to drink anything but acorn soup. The men who take part in the shooting with bows and arrows every day have to go without their breakfast. The younger boys and girls who follow up have to do all the yelling, and since they are not allowed to drink water, they all chew rum.

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Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1. (A. P.)—Wholesale quotations on butter for today were forced downward on the dairy exchange for all grades, the continued weakness of the market from yesterday being caused by increased offerings of creamery outputs. Extra cubes are 1/2c lower at 45c while standards are down a full cent to 43c. Under grades, prime firsts and first lots 42c each and stand today at 42 1/2c and 39 1/2c respectively. Storage holdings were reduced 3244 pounds.

The wholesale egg market is firm and active, with no changes in prices. Yesterday's withdrawals from storage, 1628 cases were larger than usual.

Activity in the wholesale produce trade continued nearly as quiet this morning as during the past two rainy days. Prices remained generally steady for most lines and receipts were of ordinary volume.

Local Concord grapes are arriving in moderate quantities and moving at 6c per pound.

Local tomatoes were selling at from 50c to 75c per box. Local cauliflower was moving actively at 1.45 to 1.85, according to size and quality.

New Rogue River D'Anjou pears, loose packs, were being offered at \$2.25 per box.

Country dressed meats and poultry were quiet at steady quotations in the morning's early trade.

STRIKE SETTLED.
CHICAGO, Oct. 1. (AP)—The six months' coal mining suspension in Illinois which threw more than 70,000 men out of work, was settled today, when miners and operators accepted a proposal of a joint committee by which operations are to be resumed. Each side ratified the proposal which required a joint meeting to make valid the proposal, but both sides said this was a mere formality.

MEETING CALLED.
SALEM, Ore., Oct. 1. (AP)—Governor Patterson today issued a call for joint meeting of the boards of regents of the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college to be held at Eugene next Friday. FRANCE REPLIES
PARIS, Oct. 1. (AP)—France's reply to the latest American memorandum regarding the tariff question has been handed to Sheldon Whitehouse, the charge d'affaires, and will be forwarded to Washington today. The agreement between Mr. Whitehouse in behalf of the embassy and M. Lukanowski, representing the French government, was that nothing would be allowed to reach the public as to the character of the reply until it has been received in Washington.
