



## OLD TIME MEN HARD TO FIND

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 5. (UP)—Scarcity of veteran material has apparently doomed the University of Southern California to a back seat in the Pacific Coast conference football race this season.

Fourteen men taken from Coach Howard Jones' runner-up for the title last year have so weakened the aggregation that even a loyal student body can see only prospects of a fourth place team.

Ten of the 14 missing are linemen, six of them men who started every major contest last year. Only Jess Hibbs, all-coast tackle, remains of the 1926 starters.

The backfield will be considerably stronger than the line, but even that statement does not mean air-tight. The names of Morton Kaer, quarterback, and Manuel Laraneta, fullback, are missing and with their departure the fleet-footed, effective ball-carrying combination is broken.

Others are missing, too, in the backfield, but Coach Jones sees a possibility of rounding out an excellent combination in their stead.

At quarterback there will be Don Williams and Howard Elliott, both capable men, Morley Drury, captain, will be at one halfback position and Lloyd Thomas at the other. Max Thomas is favored to fill the fading boots of Laraneta at fullback.

For utility in the backfield there will be Harry Edelson, Hersh Bonham, Harold Wheeler, Russ Saunders, Bill Ford and Rocky Kemp.

Outside of Jesse Hibbs at tackle, the line will naturally be shifted to an experiment. Four substitute lettermen of last season, Jim Moser, end; John Fox, center; Al Schaub, guard and Al Scheving, tackle, will be worked in vacancies if possible.

Present indications are that Bert Heiser, halfback, will be shifted to guard and Charles Boren, another halfback, to end. Nathan Barrager, last year's freshman fullback, will go to center.

After the shifts, the line will probably be Moser and Boren ends; Hibbs and Scheving or Fox, tackles; Heiser and Schaub, guards, and Barrager, center. Substitute linemen last year who will be available are Lowry McCaslin, Larry Diehl and Leslie Lavelle, ends; Hilton McCabe, Gene Beattie and Marion Morrison, tackles; Oliver White, guards.

## MAKING WAR ON GRASSHOPPERS

War on millions of grasshopper eggs, covering an area of some 6,000 acres was started this morning by Frank Corpening on his farm land in Tule lake when the initial try-out of an Oliver "Gold Digger" was pulled by a Fordson tractor with an auxiliary transmission was put into use.

Owning one of the most valuable farms on Tule lake, Corpening made up his mind to rid his ground of the hopper, which practically destroyed his crop this past year. The use of the plow has long been urged by C. A. Henderson, county agent and the idea is being watched with interest by hundreds of farmers throughout this section.

According to Henderson a depth of less than five inches is needed to get the eggs and destroy them now, as they are hatching in their shell. The plow consists of 12 discs of 20 inches and will cut a swath of 6 feet.

"This is the time of year to declare war on the hoppers and no way can prove so successful as the use of the plow to lift the ground and ruin their nests of eggs," one prominent farmer declared this morning.

## WHIPPET MAKES A FINE RECORD

Traveling continuously for 720 hours without a motor stop, averaging 31.11 miles to the gallon of fuel, covering a total distance of 12,008 miles, is the newest achievement of a Whippet motor, according to figures released this week by the Willis-Overland company, giving the details of one of the most strenuous economy, endurance and stamina tests ever attempted by any motor car.

For thirty days and nights the Whippet roadster's engine was kept running without a stop, the climax of the tests coming at the end of the route at Ithica, New York, where the car was driven around the half-mile dirt track breaking the track record for stock four-cylinder cars over a five-mile distance. The Whippet negotiated the five miles in 8 minutes 24 seconds. This notable performance was done at the conclusion of the 12,008 miles trip.

During the grueling test the Whippet roadster was driven by 321 drivers. In addition to the unusual fuel economy mark the Whippet consumed but seven quarts of oil and seven gallons of water. This gives an oil consumption of 13.95 miles to the quart for the entire trip.

Hour after hour, day after day, night after night for 720 hours the Whippet roadster continued to speed through the hills and level highways of New York and Pennsylvania, and not for a moment did the Whippet engine fail to function perfectly. During the long grueling 11 nights of rain were encountered, and for ten days of the time the Whippet operated on mud roads, cement highway and hard stone roads. Every condition was faced by the Whippet, but according to the drivers it responded without hesitation to every demand.

This unusual test which would tax the endurance of larger and higher priced cars, was under the official observation of Edwin Baumgarten, who carefully checked the mileage, fuel, oil and water consumption. In the speed trial against time, Jerry Johnson, well known race pilot, was behind the wheel of the Whippet.

Nineteen counties in Southern New York and Northern Pennsylvania were covered during the strenuous test. At Hornell, N. Y., a 20-minute stop was made to repair two broken springs, the break coming when the Whippet ran off the road during the night in a dense fog. The run was finished on the original tires.

This remarkable test for economy, endurance and stamina is cited by Willis-Overland officials as another outstanding Whippet accomplishment which adds to the score of other Whippet records—records never before equalled by any four-cylinder car.

BERLIN, Oct. 5. (AP)—There is a slump in the business of the European Waste Material Merchants, otherwise the rag trade. The reason given for it is that women hardly wear any clothes at all and that the men have no money to spend on new suits and have to make old ones do.

The replacing of wooden and cotton stockings by artificial silk is another factor. It is also said that less shoddy enters into the manufacture of cheap cloth than before. But the chief complaint is that rag picking gives too much trouble for what little money there may be in it.

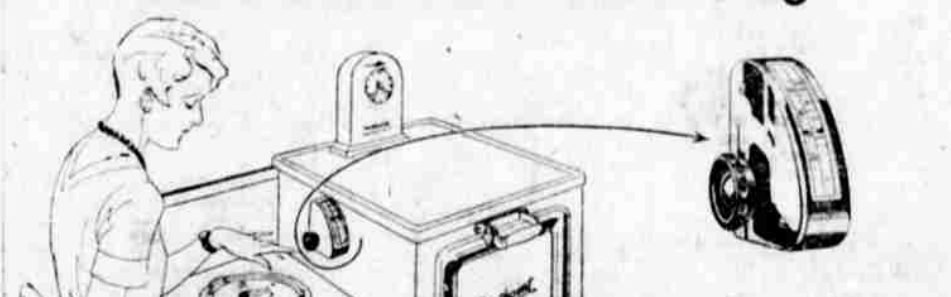
