NASH EXPANDS ITS FACTORIES

Demand for the Nash car, which since the introduction of the present new series on June 28, has been the greatest in the history of Nash motors, makes necessary expansion at three of the company's plants, involving expenditures for buildings and additional equipment of approximately \$1,200,000. Increased production will follow completion of the expansion program, says the Templat Motor company of Klamath Falls.

Announcement of the Nash Motors company's plans to increase production facilities to meet the demand during the 1928 season, was made today by C. W. Nash, president of the company. "We have found it necessary," said Mr. Nash, "to provide for greater production particularly at our Klamath Falls plant, which program actually involves a corresponding increase in bodies, so the Seaman body plant at Milwaukee and the Seaman-Bunnell corporation at Pine Bluff, Arkansas, also will figure in the expansion. At no time since July 1 has the Nash Motors company been able to fill all orders for the standard six line." The program at Klamath Falls for two new buildings and a large amount of additional equipment for these and for expansion in the present buildings at a total cost of about \$500,000.

The immense Seaman body plant in Milwaukee will be increased in size by a new five story building 192 feet by 100 feet, which together with the necessary additional equipment will mean an expenditure of about \$50,000. The Pine Bluff plant, which manufactures the wood parts that go into Nash enclosed bodies, will be increased by one-third its present size at a cost of \$350,000. With these factory expansions the Klamath plant of the Nash Motors company will have a capacity of from 400 to 450 cars a day. This, together with the manufacturing facilities of the Nash car plants in Kenosha and Milwaukee, is expected to place the company in a position to care for the increasing demand during the 1928 season.

DR. HALL TALKS TO TEACHERS

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Oct. 5 (Press)—"The fundamental problem of constructive patriotism in America today is to establish new instincts to the basic social instincts of the voter, so that his response to problems of peace will be as effective and virile as his response to war," declared Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University of Oregon, who delivered two addresses before the Teachers' Institute of Tillamook county yesterday.

In the interests of better government, which Dr. Hall holds to be one of the most important phases of education, boys and girls should be made familiar with the workings of legislative and law enforcement bodies. These subjects should be made interesting and human to the youth, so that interest and ambition may be aroused.

Dr. Hall touched on psychology in his talk, pointing out that "school spirit" could be used effectively in developing a better Americanism, and stressing the fact that instincts of people play a large part in their attitude and behavior.

A plea for teaching of such subjects of history on an intellectual basis, rather than on a "school spirit" basis, which glorifies a large part, was made by Dr. Hall. The work that George Washington did during his life can be made far more interesting to the student than the mere recitation that "Washington never told a lie." It was stated. Children should be taught to honor and admire national heroes, but this admiration should be wholesome, just and honest.

ELEVEN YEARS SHOWS INCREASE

Carrying them back to 11 years ago when they were both employed at the local post office, before they had been raised to the ranks of postmaster and assistant postmaster, John A. McCord and R. L. Griffith checked reports in their offices this morning to find that during that period of time, clerks have been increased 100 per cent and carriers 250 per cent. The force in every department has just doubled during that time.

With the close of the quarterly report on September 30, a gain of 5 per cent was found over that of the same period of time in 1926, postal receipts showed this morning.

Delivery service on Mt. Whitney street has been extended from Seventh to Ninth streets and becomes effective at once as the result of a petition being granted by headquarters at Washington, D. C.

In order to have the extension made it was necessary for more than 50 per cent of the residential district to be improved, houses numbered, sidewalks in and receptacles placed for the distribution of mail.

OLD EGGS.
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12 (U. P.)—Speaking of eggs, here's an old one—older than the ice age. It is the only known existing specimen of a giant ostrich egg 150,000 years old. It is technically known as the struthiolitus, which was quite common in North China in the late Pliocene and early Pleistocene ages. C. A. E. Carr's hobby is collecting fossil specimens and he brought this one back from China on a recent business trip. Particles of these specimens have been found before, but Carr's specimen is the only one known to science. "It is surprising that it has come down to the present time in such a wonderful state of preservation," Carr said. "It can only be concluded that previous to its discovery it was surrounded by a protective covering of some sort which time gradually disposed of. It is very probable that it was formerly located in the province of Kansu and that during the ice age it was lodged in an ice deposit and gradually traveled to the place where it was discovered."
