GIRL'S PLANE IS SAFE IN OCEAN

LISBON, Oct. 4. (AP)—The Junkers plane D-1230 which was forced to descend into the sea yesterday off Cape Horn enroute from Amsterdam to Lisbon, was not damaged and is awaiting the arrival of a tug which is proceeding to the spot, says a message received today from Santa Cruz. The advice said that the D-1230, which is on a flight from Germany to the United States by way of the Azores, descended in the sea last evening because of a heavy fog, just northwest of Lisbon. Neither the machine nor its occupants, who included Lt. Bo Dillenz, Vienna actress, was injured and it was hoped that the flight to Lisbon could be resumed today.

The seaplane this morning was surrounded by fishing boats and the sea was calm.
