A Sewer System--Yes

After putting off a big undertaking for some time a community comes to the point of making up its mind to do it.

That is the condition in Klamath Falls relative to the city sewer system. Its heavy cost and the fact that "people have got along with it" caused the delay. But all admit now that the zero hour has arrived and something must be done.

That something must be a big undertaking which will provide this community with sewer system and drainage for fifty years to come.

It will cost \$300,000 at the least, but it must be done. There will be little opposition to the bonds this time, judging from the sentiment to be heard on every side.

But there will be a very great interest in getting the plans and details worked out right. In the last campaign Engineer Kennedy presented a sewer plan that is probably all right. It was checked by a sanitary engineer from Long Beach who pronounced it satisfactory. Neither Mr. Kennedy nor the Long Beach man had any personal acquaintance here. No one knew anything about them, only what was dug up in records and references furnished.

There may be a feeling here that some known engineer in the state should be invited in to pass on the Kennedy plans or to offer other suggestions. And little fault could be found with such a request.

Klamath Falls is building for the future in the sewer construction and we want to make no mistake. In order to be fully satisfied the advice of several capable men in sanitary engineering would not be a bad investment at all.

When Farming Hits

No line of business is better than farming when she hits right. We mean by this that dull years follow each other in the farming game until the men who work the soil almost become exasperated. Then a good year happens along and note the debts that are paid, the mortgages that are lifted and the buying power increased.

This is one of the good years. Its results will not balance the ledger for the lean years the farmers have had lately but it will help a lot.

The state of Montana was a broke community for years. People were low in spirits. This year there is a big crop with good prices in Montana and she is coming back mighty fast.

In Oregon we have had year after year when land was not producing its taxes, but this year the Oregon farmers are going to have money and they have a bright look in their eyes.

We are pleased to know that our old personal friend and political enemy, ex-Governor Walter M. Pierce, has harvested 800 acres of wheat that made 40 bushels to the acre. In addition to that Walter has a fine band of eyes that lambled out a hundred per cent, making him a fine return. In addition to that he has a herd of the finest white face cattle in eastern Oregon and they are bringing in a lot of money. Walter will not be preaching discontent with a few years like this one. We even doubt if he will be in favor of any kind of an income tax. And be it said in all fairness that Walter is one of the big farmers of Oregon. He has a boy who is one of the best men in operating ranches and running livestock whom we have ever known. Hence the father and son make a happy and successful combination.

Cancel the License

We notice with considerable pleasure that California is canceling licenses of drunken drivers. When a man is caught driving a machine when he is drunk he is barred from driving again for a period of time. It is working well, we are told, and it will work well.

Some of these drunks who appear in Gaghagen or Barnes courts would not be there so often if their license to drive a machine was taken away when the fine is collected or jail sentence pronounced.

Why Oregon does not get to the point of enforcing her laws with a vengeance is past understanding. Almost every day the newspapers carry stories of the drunken driver, yet who has heard of an attempt being made to cancel a license. There is no statute bearing directly on that subject, but there are plenty of police protection statutes that would enable such action by the courts.

MAY OPEN MONDAY

Opening of the county high school is one thing that is of great interest to the entire community. As yet nothing authentic can be stated relative to its opening, except that indications at present show that next Monday the great school will wheel into operation. The school board met last night but nothing was given to the press although it is understood the board agreed that

MEXICANS ARE STILL FIGHTING

said to be closing in on the combined rebel band in a pincer movement, one column of 1500 troops operating from Vera Cruz, under General Jesus Aguirre and the other of 4,500 from Mexico City commanded by General Gonzalo Escobar. Against these numbers, Gomez and Almada have not more than 1500 or 2,000 men at the most liberal estimates.

President Calles, issuing a summary of the situation, expressed hope that the rebellion would be completely quelled within twenty-four hours.

His statement indicated that the rebel forces were lacking in artillery, as upon boarding trains at Texcoco for the east, Almada's column was said to have abandoned

21 cannon which they had taken from Mexico City.

Following up a vote of confidence in the government, the chamber of deputies expelled from congress twenty-five deputies who supported the presidential campaigns of Gomez and Serrano.

The presidential bureau today declared that the combined force of General Gomez and General Almada was the only rival group in the field in the entire republic.

Plotted to Capture Calles

EL PASO, Texas, Oct. 6. (AP)—El Continental, Spanish language newspaper says today that the leaders of the new abortive revolution against the Calles administration in Mexico plotted to capture President Calles and General Obregon, Calles' choice for president next year and execute them, a military "directorio" headed by General Francisco Serrano to rule the republic.

The revolutionaries planned to capture Calles and Obregon at the military festival last Sunday at Valviena field.

General Ordered Shot

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 6. (AP)—General Alfredo Roda Quijano, charged with leading his troops of the Mexico City garrison to rebellion, was sentenced to death by a summary court martial today. The court set this morning at 11 o'clock as the time of his execution.

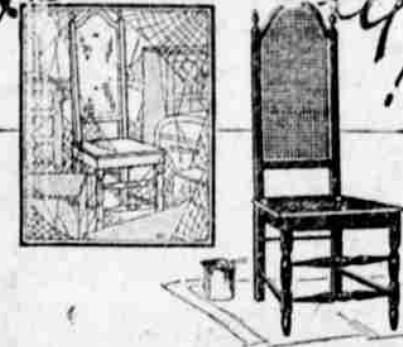
