They went directly to two trunks belonging to a jewelry salesman and carried them out. The robbers then forced their victim into the auto and drove to Pasadena. They rifled the trunks enroute and threw them from the machine. Watson was released in the Pasadena race bowl.

POTATO EYE SPROUT.
An eye of a potato is a cluster of buds and may develop one or many sprouts, reports John Bushnell of the Ohio Experiment station. If there are many eyes on one seed piece, some may not sprout at all.

HORSE COST HALVED.
Two hours of horse labor cost no more last year than one hour in 1920, says John P. Dowler of the Ohio Experiment station. This cost has been cut down from an average of 25.5 cents an hour to 12.5 cents.

The Department of Agriculture's ten-million-dollar spring campaign against the corn borer is said to have checked this pest's increase in the infested states of Ohio, Michigan and Pennsylvania. A survey of 743 townships indicates an increase of 50 per cent in borer population, but this increase is an improvement over that of last year. With no campaign last year, the borer population increased 400 per cent over that of 1925.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—The chap who coined that well-worn adage, "Beauty is only skin-deep," was no artist—and for that you have the word of Harrison Fisher, who, after having glorified our magazine covers with intriguing feminine faces these 27 years, should be qualified to speak.

"Merely pretty girls are a drug on the market in New York," declares Mr. Fisher in an interview published in McClure's magazine for October. Still models are hard to find, he adds, for nine out of ten of them lack beauty, and their faces, if faithfully reproduced by the painter, would be dull, flat and unattractive.

REBELLION IN MEXICO ENDS

In two and three. The two leaders, with bodyguards of not more than 50 men each, would either be quickly captured, the authorities said, or would "disappear into mere bandits hiding in the hills."

Generals Are Killed.
General Francisco Serrano, named as the other principal leader of the revolt, which was allegedly based on the "non-revolution" opposition to the presidential candidacy of former President Obregon, captured and executed twenty-four hours after the mutiny of Almadá and part of the Mexican City garrison the night of October 2.

Thus the movement has stamped out within a week's time what is generally conceded to have been the most formidable movement against it since President Calles was elected to succeed Obregon. The old saying in Mexico, "The revolution always wins," has proved a fallacy in this case.

Sunday Battle Decisive.
The battle which brought such drastic defeat to the rebels was fought Sunday, the spurs of the defeated rebels continuing over night.

After considerable maneuvering, the federal troops who had been pursuing the rebels for several days in the vicinity of Perote, western Vera Cruz, finally cornered them at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon and forced battle near the town of Aljauabasco. The fighting continued fiercely until 8 o'clock in the evening.

General Escobar, commanding the federalists, reported that when the battle had been under way two hours, Gomez and Almadá with small bodies of followers, "fled shamefully," abandoning their men.

Gomez fled in the direction of Coahuila, 22 miles southeast of the old fortress of Perote and not far from the Puebla state line.

The main body of rebels withdrew in the same direction and between 500 and 600 men with their officers, constituting the infantry commanded by Gomez, surrendered there the next morning.

Two Generals at Large.
Meanwhile the authorities of every Mexican port and the officers of all ships in the navy have been ordered to exercise the utmost vigilance to prevent Gomez and Almadá from escaping from the country.

A motion to make the presidential term six years instead of four as at present, passed its first reading in the senate last night. If finally adopted it will require ratification by the majority of the state legislatures.

It will then become effective for the next presidential term, for which General Obregon will apparently be elected, there being no other candidates in the field with the elimination of Gomez and Serrano.

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Rides the Tides to Set New Record In 40-Mile Swim Around Island

Defied Driftwood.

Edward Keating, James Burns, William Erickson and Paul Chuteau were among swimmers to note who watched Summers' progress from accompanying boats.

First Fame.

The American claimed he had purchased the ticket from an unidentified person in the Strand. He said he had paid \$15 for it.

Taking for granted that the man's story was true, the palace

police released him just before tea time this afternoon.

Seven tickets, according to British legationnaires, were stolen yesterday from their quarters in the Hotel Cecil. None of the others were presented at the palace as far as is known.
