### Oregon Given Credit

Oregon's notable success in oil-surfacing state highways in the dry portions of the state has attracted national attention, according to officials of the highway office. Engineers from several western states have visited Oregon to study the method. In no other state has a method been perfected, short of hard surface paving, that has given a smooth, even surface that stands up throughout all the seasons and under varying weather conditions. In a recent report by the federal bureau of roads it was said: "Oregon in the past three years has had noteworthy success in the treatment of fine crushed rock and gravel surfacing, and several hundred miles have been thus improved in sections of the state having low rainfall. A California redwood petroleum, marketed as fuel oil, is purchased for this purpose, using specifications which are still considered incomplete. Heavier oils and oil-tar products have also been used to some extent in an experimental way."

(Continued from page 1) service of humanity," he declared, "and by remaining as a leader in great financial and industrial enterprises and the other by turning his great talents to the administration of public finance as secretary of the treasury of the United States, where his leadership in the last six years has been greatly instrumental in restoring the economic equilibrium of the world."

Establishment of this government and of this community have been brought about, Mr. Coolidge said, "by a sacrifice effort by the making of a sacrifice that reached to life itself."

"The results," he added, "have come from men who could face facts with realities; from men whose hands were hardened at the plow, whose faces were blackened at the forge, whose bodies had been exposed to the fire of hostile forces."

### NO FLAG OF TRUCE

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 13. (AP)—There is nothing to the reported peace pact between Jack Dempsey and his former manager, reported by the New York News, Jack Kearns, the former heavyweight champion told the Associated Press here today. "I know nothing about it and wouldn't consider it for a minute," he said, when the Associated Press dispatch quoting a copyrighted article in the New York Daily News was read to him over the telephone. "The matter of the law suits is in the hands of my attorney and he is ready to go trial the minute they are," Dempsey added.

"As for any peace proposals, I haven't heard of any coming from Kearns and certainly none have been made by me and I wouldn't consider them."

Dempsey leaves today for Los Angeles and will be accompanied by his wife Estelle Taylor, the motion picture star.
