

# Mystery ship Floating on High Seas; Is Menace to All Navigation on Ocean

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.—Another of the mysteries of the sea remains unsolved today despite the efforts of governments of half a dozen nations to solve the story that is stranger than fiction.

The latest report of the local hydrographic office containing its periodic warnings to ships at sea cautions against the possibility of encountering a mystery derelict floating somewhere 1500 to 1600 miles northwest of Honolulu.

Four times the ominous bulk has been seen by ships traversing the wide sea lanes of the Pacific. Each time those who saw it were unable to furnish any information that would aid in establishing identity of the mystery vessel.

The only identification marks seen on the ship were the numerals "O-2," barely decipherable after the vessel's ceaseless battle with the elements for a period whose length can only be conjectured.

No nation on earth has claimed the derelict. A search of naval registers throughout the world has failed to disclose these numerals or to shed any light on the name and nationality of the phantom submarine.

In the haunts of seafaring men in San Francisco, the derelict submarine is a topic of frequent conversation. Many have been the conjectures they have offered, but many have been the stories of other missing ships whose fate was recalled by the sighting of the submarine.

The old sailors recall the strange derelict the British steamer *Mina Brea* discovered a year ago on the Atlantic. It was without identifying marks or registration name.

Only five feet of its stern was showing above the water, yet a light was burning from the masthead, showing that it had only recently been deserted.

The captain of the *Mina Brea* concluded it was a rum runner and a victim of the war between hijackers and rum runners on the high seas.

Another story related is that of the derelict schooner found off the coast of Costa Rica in 1924 by the steamer *Satsuma*. The ship was beating an erratic course under full sail—"A paint-

ed ship upon a painted ocean." No trace has ever been found of her crew.

The name of the vessel was found to be "Panvigo" but a search of maritime records of every important country in the world disclosed no further information concerning her. The crew of the steamer *Satsuma* found the lifeboats of the "Panvigo" were in the davits. Her decks were awash. Every yard of her canvas was spread. But what caused her to be deserted, or what became of her crew was never known.

## CLOCK TELLS DAY, YEAR, AND POSITION OF STARS

LUND, Sweden, Oct. 21. (AP)—An ingenious medieval clock in the Cathedral of Lund has attracted 270,000 visitors during the last four years. Not only does the clock tell the time of the day, but also the day, week and month of the year and the position of the sun, the moon and the stars.

The timepiece was constructed in 1330. In 1600 the mechanism refused to function, and in 1827 the clock was discarded; but, thanks to the efforts of the Swedish architect Theodore Wohlen and the Danish clock maker Mogens Madsen, the historical timepiece was thoroughly restored in 1923.

When it strikes, bells intone an ancient hymn and diminutive figures, depicting the Three Wise Men, knights in armor and trumpeters become visible and move in a stately procession across the face of the clock, paying homage to a small statue of the Virgin Mary and the Christ child in the center.

Nothing definite has been disclosed officially to account for the movements of Inez from the time she disappeared until she jumped or fell from a freight train early yesterday at Cascade Locks. One report said she and the Walters girl said they played hooky Monday and went to an orchard to pick apples.

Officers were trying to run down unverified reports concerning the movements of the two girls. Miss Walters is 14 years old, but, according to descriptions furnished by Hood River officials, looks to be about 18. She is rather tall, weighs about 145 pounds. Her hair is light brown and her eyes are hazel. When last seen she was wearing a dark blue flannel "middy." Her complexion is fair.
