Lakeview Has Convention—Lakeview has functioned with a convention. Harry Bailey, leading merchant, president. At-torney O. C. Gibbs was nominated for mayor. S. A. Jetmore and E. D. Everett were nominated for the city council. The election is to be November 3. There will be competition between O. H. Bratton and H. J. Augstead for city recorder and between M. K. Gunther and A. J. Swift for city treasurer. All of the nominees and candidates, as well as the officers and delegates of the convention, are citizens of standing and some of them are men of state-wide prominence. Lakeview has a way of conducting municipal and school government along lines of economy and efficiency. The leading business men and taxpayers take an active part in civic affairs.—Oregon Voter.

LITTLE CHANGE—NEW YORK, Oct. 21. (AP)—Reports from 500 of the larger commercial mills of the country to the National Lumber Manufacturers' association for the week ended October 15, show little change from the week before. Shipments of softwood mills, however, were considerably less. A notable decrease in new business was shown, compared with a year ago, with production and shipments about the same. Hardwood operations were larger in all three items, than in the preceding week. Unfilled orders of 228 southern pine and west coast mills were 554,542,653 feet, against 561,045,842 feet the previous week.
