Arrests Galore; Scores Guarded In Court Room

IWW leaders have not announced what action will be taken as the result of the arrest of the pickets.

Those arrested included one woman with a small baby in her arms and also a 14-year-old girl. The prisoners have been singing "Solidarity," an IWW song, ever since they were brought to the court room here.

In the Trinidad district, forty-four persons were arrested today as alleged pickets. The sheriff's office reported that several of the roads were patrolled by pickets, including a number of women and that in several instances miners on their way to work were turned back.

New Hostelry At Baker Soon

BAKER, Ore., Oct. 21. (AP)—L. B. Weeks of La Grande, who has been conducting negotiations here for the erection of a \$200,000 five-story hotel, announces plans for the work have been completed and construction of the building started as soon as the site has been secured.

A group of local business men have underwritten the purchase of a site to cost \$14,000. The hotel will contain 105 rooms.

HOSPITAL CASE IS UP AGAIN

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 21. (AP)—Whether the Oregon law exempting the property of charitable institutions from taxation is constitutional, and what constitutes a charity, are the main questions involved in the case of the Mercy hospital of Eugene against Lane county; appellant, which is being heard by the supreme court today.

The Lane county assessor set a precedent in the state by attempting to tax property of the hospital. The Sisters of Mercy, a Catholic organization, retained by injunction proceedings. The lower court for Lane county held that some of the property which is not in actual use had been taxed and the used property not taxed. The county appealed. The county attorney H. E. Slatery, contends that the law is unconstitutional in that it grants privileges and immunities to one class of persons not granted to others. He contended that institutions operating for pay are not charitable. L. L. Ray and Donald Young represent the hospital. B. F. Kenney, Lane county assessor attended the hearing.

A brief as friends of the court was filed by J. P. Kavanaugh and Hall S. Lusk, attorneys of Portland. Their argument supports the hospital.

The decision will affect a large number of institutions that have property not actually used for educational or charitable purposes, such as lawns, gardens and recreation grounds.

Rumanian Royalty Takes 'to Gum'

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Oct. 20. (AP)—American chewing gum may now count Queen Marie and the entire Rumanian royal family among its devotees. It was first introduced into Rumania by Princess Ileana after her visit to the United States.
