

AMERICA DRUNK WITH POWER IS PURIST'S VIEW

LA CROSSE, Wis., Oct. 21. (AP)—"America is drunk with power, tottering with wealth and insane with an orgy of self-expression," George Chester Wise, professor of modern languages at Parsons college, Fairfield, Ia., declared today at the international law conference.

The lawlessness, unbelief, vice, crime, divorce, unnatural affection, degeneration and anarchy in the country today proves the assertion, he said.

In order to guide youth's way over the roads of life, in an effort to avoid such treacherous pitfalls, Professor Wise suggested that old men and gray haired women be called upon to formulate laws of life.

Charles Sherman Bodwell, Boston, general secretary of the New England Watch and Ward Society, declared that the reformers "were not necessarily natural born trouble makers or disturbers of the peace." Hostility to vice, he said, has naturally arisen in the minds of many people as a result of calamities occurring in their families so that warfare against vice amounts to a justifiable family feud.

Creation of a new department in the national government to the home was suggested by Dr. Emma P. A. Drake, Portland, Ore.

The conference voted to solicit \$20,000 for the purpose of financing a world purity congress to be held in 1929.

Dog Mourns For Murdered Woman

NICE, France, Oct. 21. (AP)—Captain Venesias De Krupf, described as a former officer in the Russian imperial guard, today was under arrest charged with the murder of the French wife of an American whom he met through their joint membership in a "back to nature" cult.

After the body of the victim, Mme. Marcelle Lord, wife of Horace W. Lord, of Fall River, Mass., had been discovered, police instituted a search for De Krupf who was known to have been attentive to the woman. He was arrested near the scene as he attempted to visit a friend of Mme. Lord.

De Krupf in a confession to the police said that he had killed Mme. Lord when she attempted to prevent him from committing suicide. He did not remember how he had killed her.

The plaintive whining of a dog on the balcony of Mme. Lord's villa here led to the discovery of her body. Police forced an entrance and found her slumped to death through the heart.

Last year, police learned, Mme. Lord became acquainted with De Krupf at Grasse near Nice where both were members of a German "back to nature" cult, which was suppressed by the authorities.

Police believe that Mme. Lord, who possessed independent financial means and property on

the Riviera, helped De Krupf financially. The motive for his act was not announced in the confession but authorities believe a quarrel arose over financial matters.

JAPAN PLANS AIRDROME FOR AERIAL VISITORS

TOKYO, Oct. 21. (AP)—The communications department of the Japanese government is planning the construction of an "international airdrome" near Susaki, on the Chiba side of Tokyo Bay, and for the purpose has inserted an item of about \$1,000,000 in next year's budget.

The field would be so arranged that both land planes and seaplanes could land and take off from it. The authorities believe that the next few years may bring many aerial visitors to Japan and it is hoped that accommodations for their comfort and convenience can be provided. The site of the proposed airdrome is so located that foreign aviators will not have to fly over Japanese fortifications when visiting the Empire.
