INSANITARY WATERWAYS CALLED U. S. DISGRACE

CINCINNATI, Oct. 20 (AP)—Insanitary waterways were described as "a disgrace to our vanishing civilization" by W. L. Stevenson, chief engineer of the Pennsylvania State Department of Health, in an address today before the annual convention of the American Public Health Association.

"It is a heavy responsibility," he said, "to maintain reasonably cleanly waterways and to bring about abatement of preventable abuses. This will never be attained through the mere enactment of statutes, though prudent, reasonable, constructive laws wisely administered are a necessary adjunct to the work."

"Sound engineering, recognition of economic principles, scientific research, education of the public and the co-ordination of practicable policies to make comprehensive plans are the dominant factors involved in solving the problem of waterway sanitation."
