Many employees so that the decks might be cleared for the opening of the exchange this morning. Thousands of margin calls, asking for more collateral on speculative accounts, were sent out although the leading commission houses reported that the majority of such accounts were strongly entrenched.

## A Natural Sequel

The recent reaction in prices, which has dropped many of the leading issues 10 to 20 points below the year's high levels, is regarded by bankers as a natural sequel of the speculative excess and that have been taking place in the market in recent weeks. Prices have been climbing steadily in the face of disappointing trade news and poor earnings reports but until now these factors have been disregarded. On the other hand, cheap money regarded as the backbone of the recent advance, has been overlooked this week as call loans dropped to 2 1/2 percent, the low level of the year.

Brokers loans, however, are at the record high figure of nearly three and one-half billion dollars, or three quarters of a billion over the total at this time last year.

**BILL HUNNEFELD** WHO TOOK PART IN THIS FREAK DOUBLE HEADER

Shortstop Bill Hunnefeld of the Chicago White Sox had the distinction of playing in perhaps the most unique double-header ever staged. It was during the early days of his minor league career.

Back in 1924, Hunnefeld, then an outfielder and first sacker, was with the Montreal club of the Eastern Canada League. The date of the two freak games was May 21, 1924, and the place was Montreal. Here is the yarn as Hunnefeld told it to me.

"Talk about freak ball games, I played in two on the same day that I dare you even to tie for unusual happenings. "I was with Montreal and we were playing Quebec a double header. Montreal was the first game 7-0, our pitcher, whose

name was Jones, having the better of a hurling duel with Schweb, six hits to five. No changes were made in the lineup.

"When we came on the field for the second game, exactly the same lineup was presented by both teams, the pitchers, Schweb and Jones, essaying to work the double bill.

"In this game Schweb reversed the result, shutting out Montreal 2-0. We made only two hits in the second battle, while Jones held Quebec to five, yet lost. "I doubt if any other double header in the history of organized baseball was ever played through with the same nine men in each lineup, both games resulting in shutouts, each team winning one.

## Washington Frosh Defeated Oregon Team On Friday

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 22. (AP)—A well drilled Washington State freshman football eleven on football defeated a weak Oregon first year team here yesterday afternoon 25 to 9. The cougar youngsters displayed more power in attack, better defensive ability and better judgment of plays and fundamentals and were never in danger of having their goal line crossed. They scored twice in the first period on Oregon errors, on receiving punts, two being muffed and placing the cougar youngsters in position to score.

The puntman eleven scored again in the second quarter on some brilliant sweeps and a pass and again in the fourth period on excellent off-tackle and end runs. Oregon's only threat came in the third and fourth periods when they were fairly successful with a passing attack, but most of their gains were in mid-field.

Ellingson, cougar punter, averaged 40 yards on his kicks, considerably outpunting the Oregon booter.

The center of the Oregonian line checked the cougar advances, but the ends crumpled under a withering drive and the backs were mediocre with the exception of Kitzmiller at fullback, who bore the brunt of the punting and passing attacks.

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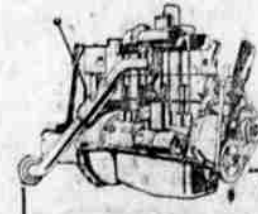
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
