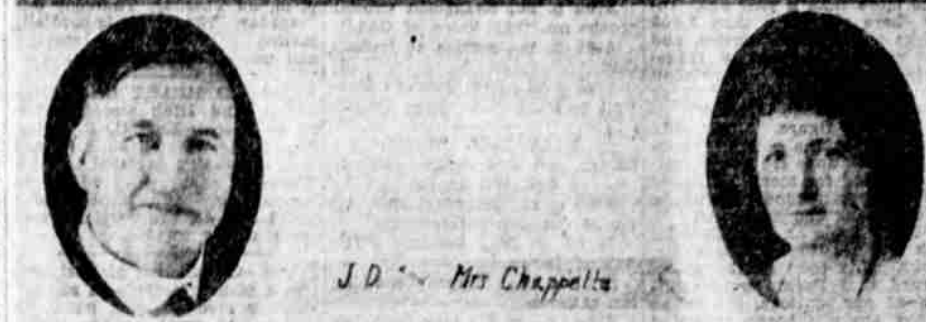

But she has not been found. Conflicting theories about her disappearance continue to develop. The district attorney and the

sheriff of Hood River county are still trying to throw the truth out of the chaos of rumors and conflicting reports today.

Meanwhile Portland police are cooperating in every possible way. Sheriff Edick of Hood River took a party of four to Cascade Locks to make a thorough search for traces of the Walters girl. Members of the party were H. Shoemaker, Craig Rat; Glen Sloan, deputy; the Rev. Henry Young, pastor of Ashbury Methodist church and Mr. Weiss, uncle of Miss Frederick.

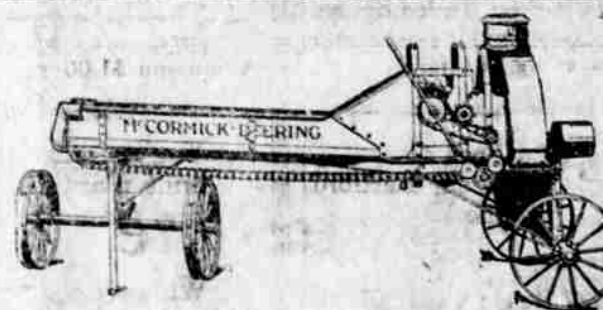
