QUICK ACTION CHECKS LARGE LOSS BY FIRE

Fire Department Extinguishes Potentially Large Blazes

With four more days to go, October gives promise of being a record breaking month for successful fire fighting in Klamath Falls. Already 14 fires have brought the fire department out, three of which had they not been checked would have meant a loss of more than \$174,000.

Three of those that might have brought a great loss were the New City Laundry, Chamber of Commerce and the River side school. Due to the prompt action of the fire department slight loss was encountered in each case.

It will be remembered that a year ago on October 16 the White Pelican hotel was totally destroyed by fire at a loss of \$21,500, the greatest loss ever experienced in this city by fire. "Despite the fact that October 1926 was thought to be a record breaking year for fires in Klamath Falls on account of the dry season, it appears that this year will far exceed that of a year ago. Nine fires were reported for the month of October 1926. September of this year shows a record of 5 fires some of which proved serious. Oak Boggs, assistant fire chief stated this morning.

serve the scissor from the pen-
sity of dumbness that once re-
sulted from such an operation
as this, is simple, resembling and
yet little more conspicuous than
an underslung pipe from the
bowl of which a tube extends to
an artificial throat opening. The
pipe bowl contains the artificial
larynx. Air from the lungs

passes through the tube to the
bowl and thence to the mouth
through the pipe stem, held in
the mouth. A tone is emitted by
the man-made larynx, and is
modified much as in normal
speech by the lips, teeth, tongue
and palate.
The normal voice with its mod-
ulations is not retained but a
new voice, slightly monotonous
but clearly intelligible is formed.
