



Farmer Admits He Fired Gun On His Ranch; Denies Any Intention to Kill or Harm

Claude Gaines, well known Klamath farmer, fired a high powered rifle south of Merrill October 23 to convey a wish to two hunters—Jack Slater and O. W. Robertson, prominent Klamath Falls business men—that he desired them to cease hunting on the land of his neighbor, a Mr. Murphy.

This much was made certain at a preliminary hearing Saturday of the rancher before Police Judge Lem L. Gashagen. But Gaines insisted that he did not fire the three shots with the intent to kill, nor did the bullets come close to the Klamath nimrod.

Decision as to whether there is sufficient evidence to bind over Gaines on the charge of assault with intent to kill will be handed down Wednesday by Police Judge Lem L. Gashagen, acting in this case as justice of the peace.

Slater testified that the land on which they were hunting was not posted and that if Gaines had requested them to leave the property of his neighbor, they would have gladly complied.

Testimony given by Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, defense witnesses, conflicted. Mr. Johnson said Gaines fired over the heads of the two nimrods. Mrs. Johnson insisted that Gaines did not even aim in their direction.

Gaines held that he had no intention of injuring the two hunters, that his neighbor Mr. Murphy had valuable sheep grazing on the leased land and that he was merely complying with a request to protect his neighbor's interest.

The hunters claim that the bullets came dangerously near and that the whine and scream of the pellet could plainly be heard as it passed closely overhead.

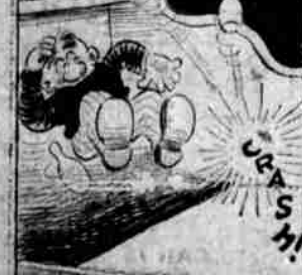
